Council Committee Will Issue Posters Setting Forth Need For Bond Issues.

Not much interest has been manifested in the special election to be held Friday to vote upon two proposed bond issues for the city, one for \$25,000 for a new city hall and one for \$15,000 for repairs and extensions to the water system.

The special city election comes exactly a week ahead of the general primary election.

A committee of the city council will issue a poster this week setting forth the necessity for the two bond issues. Attention will be called to the dilapidated condition of the present fire trap which serves as a city hall, where the lives of prisoners in the city jail are endangered and where there is no vault of any kind for the safe keeping of valuable city records.

Polling places will be as follows: First ward, the armory; second ward, city hall; third ward, Cooper house at corner of Twelfth street and Adams avenue.

The much-looked-for resumption of Anderson & Middleton's mill B is now a fact. The big whistle took the air at 7 o'clock this morning and at 8 o'clock the big saw began to hum. As the plant had been down about a year, and as numerous changes and repairs have been made, some trouble was experienced with machinery but officials of the company believe that by tomorrow lumber will be leaving the saws at almost capacity. More than 50 men were given employment by the resumption and the company now has more than 350 men on its payroll.

A full woods crew was put on some time ago and logs have been piled up here. They have been cold decked at mill A until there is space for no more there except as those on hand are sawed out.
