For the information of the Four L News, and for such of its readers as may not be conversant with the meaning of such words as "capitol" and "capital," the word, when spelled with an "o", refers to the building occupied by the national congress at Washington, or to a building occupied by a state legislature. To spell the word correctly is easy if one knows that originally it referred to the temple of Jupiter at Rome, which stood at the summit of Capitoline hill. When the word is spelled with an "a" it refers to the city which is the seat of government, and not to the building. Or it may refer to money. In this sense the Four L News will find no use for the word. It also refers to the large letter with which the Four L News sometimes starts its sentences, also to the kind of crime the Four L News is likely to want to commit when it learns what a school kid error it has made. And it made the error while poking fun at others.

If the Four L News wishes to hereafter submit its copy to us before it is sent to the printer, we will gladly correct errors such as the one herewith called to its attention, and it will not have to be the laughing stock of the D class in second grade English.

Ed Petty of Creswell writes to the Eugene Register to raise the question of the probable legality of the proposed county tax levy authorization to be voted on at the May primaries. His contention is that the law requires levies to be made in dollars and cents, therefore a tax authorization in terms of mills is not in accordance with law. Mr. Petty admits that he is not a lawyer and does not know what quirks may be given the law. He should also have admitted that he does not know the meaning of the words he used in his letter. The voters do not make a levy. They will merely authorize the levy, provided the vote is favorable, and the county court will make it in dollars and cents. The court will be instructed by the voters, nothing more. That is plain English, and the act of the voters will be well within the law.
