Nelson Carries Coos For Maglady

Members of the local Lions club believe that J. S. Maglady owes his recent nomination for state senator to the untiring efforts of N. J. Nelson Jr. of this city, and particularly to a campaign speech made by Mr. Nelson before the Lions club of Coquille.

Mr. and Mrs. Nelson, Mr. and Mrs. K. K. Mills, Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Short and Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Woods spent the week end at Arizona inn, near Coquille. When they arrived in Coquille Thursday a Lions banquet was about to be held and the members of the party were invited to be guests. Mr. Nelson was called upon to make a speech and could think of nothing better than to urge the election of his friend Maglady. The other members of the party say that the speech was such as seldom is heard even in the halls of congress and that the applause was deafening.

Coquille is in Coos county, which is not a part of the district from which Mr. Maglady was a candidate, but Mr. Nelson did not think of that and no one attempted to put him wise until after he had completed his oration. It was as good a one on the audience as on Nelson, for no one except those from here realized that they were outside Maglady's district.

Word was sent here of what happened and, following Maglady's success at the polls, C. A. Bartell wired Nelson at Coquille complimenting him upon his speech, but informed him that Maglady had failed to carry Coos county, which is part of the same senatorial district as Coos county.
