The grade schools held their annual picnic Friday at London.

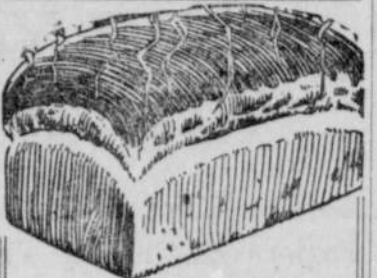
The S. V. Allisons are spending the Memorial day week end at Belknap springs.

TOM PATTON IS CAUGHT
OPERATING MOON STILL

Tom Patton was arrested up Mosby creek Thursday by deputy sheriffs on a moonshine charge.
