NOTICE OF SALE OF \$25,000.00 OF CITY HALL BONDS OF THE CITY OF COTTAGE GROVE, ORE.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN: That sealed bids will be received for the sale of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) of city hall bonds by the city recorder of said city at his office in the city of Cottage Grove until the hour of eight o'clock p. m. on Monday, the 7th day of June, 1926, at which time and in the council chamber of the city hall of Cottage Grove, said bids will be opened and considered by the common council of said city; said bonds shall bear date the first day of July, 1926, and will be due as to principal and payable by the city of Cottage Grove as follows: Principal due twenty (20) years from date, said bonds to be issued in denominations of Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) each with interest bearing coupons attached, bearing interest at Five (5%) per cent per annum from date thereof; and the said interest to be paid semi-annually on the first day of January and the first day of July of each year after date thereof. The city reserves the right to reject any or all of said bonds after ten (10) years from date thereof; and the principal and interest shall be payable at the city treasurer's office in Cottage Grove, Oregon. The whole of said bonds shall be concurrent and shall be without priority as to each other, and shall be a general obligation of the city of Cottage Grove, Oregon.

Said bonds are to be negotiable and shall be sold for not less than their par value, plus accrued interest. The council reserves the right to reject any and all bids; and said bonds are to be disposed of under an Act entitled, "An act to amend the Charter of the City of Cottage Grove, Lane County, Oregon, by adding a new chapter thereto authorizing and empowering the Common Council of the City to issue and sell negotiable bonds of the City to the amount of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00), or so much thereof as may be necessary for the purpose of building and constructing and equipping a City Hall in said City of Cottage Grove," and pursuant to Ordinance No. 453, passed by the Council and approved by the Mayor the 17th day of May, 1926.

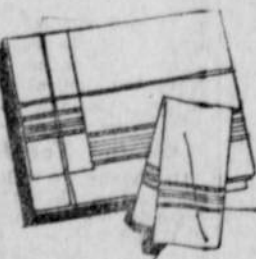
