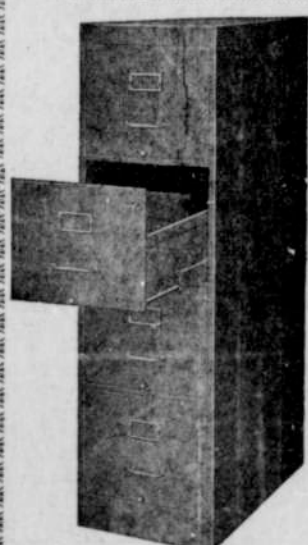

ANDERSON & MIDDLETON RECEIVE AUTO RAIL CAR

The Anderson & Middleton company has received a 440 Mac rail car that will be used in the transportation of men, materials and supplies into its national forest operations above Rujada. In design it is a huge automobile motor mounted on a small flat car. Gasoline furnishes the motive power, which makes the Mac suitable for operations in the national forests during the period of the year when wood burning locomotives can not be used on account of danger of fire. It is also cheaper to operate for handling small loads than one of the regular locomotives.

The rail car has four-wheel drive and four-wheel brakes and is the most modern of logging equipment for the speedy handling of light loads. It has sufficient motive power for the handling of 10 or 12 cars on level track and during the past few days has been used in the Anderson & Middleton yards here for switching.

TERMINAL FACILITIES ARE BEING PROVIDED

Work was commenced yesterday clearing the ground on the west side of the plant of the Standard Seasoning society at Latham for the installation of terminal facilities.
