WHAT OTHERS THINK OF HOME NEWSPAPER.

(Eugene Register.) The other day this newspaper printed a list of Cottage Grove's industries, and omitted the newspaper. The omission was unintentional, but nevertheless inexcusable.

No recital of the forces that make the wheels go round in Cottage Grove could be complete without the inclusion of Cottage Grove Sentinel. It is one of the best newspapers in Oregon.

Its editor has collected and displayed on the walls of his office clippings of material from the Cottage Grove Sentinel and of references to the Sentinel and its editor that have appeared in other newspapers. It is an astonishing exhibit. Although it has been but a few months in the making, it covers almost an entire wall.

If the material there quoted—all of it referring, nearly always in complimentary terms, to Cottage Grove—had been paid for at space rates by the chamber of commerce, the cost would have exceeded, in all probability, the total annual budget.

Yet it was all good advertising—the very best of advertising, in fact. The value of a good newspaper to its community is almost inestimable.

Cottage Grove is one of the best small cities of Oregon. A large part of Lane county's vast timber stand is tributary to it, and the beauty of its adjacent scenery is indicated by the fact that the largest moving picture enterprise yet brought to Oregon is operating there.

Not long ago this writer predicted that Cottage Grove will be a city of 10,000 in the near future. Every day that prediction seems more reasonable.

Sweden Birthplace of Early American Artist

Gustavus Hesselius has been called "the first painter of recognized merit known to have practiced art in this country," but he was not an American by birth. He was born in Folkarna, Sweden, in the province of Delecarlia, in 1682. He came to America in 1711, to the Swedish colony on the Delaware river, landing at Christina—now Wilmington, Del. He soon went to Philadelphia, where he made his home and where he died May 25, 1755.

On September 5, 1721, Hesselius received the first public art commission known to have been given in this country, "to draw ye history of our Blessed Saviour and ye twelve apostles at ye last supper" for the altar of St. Barnabas' church in Queen Anne parish, Maryland. The contract was fulfilled, but the church was destroyed in 1773 and the painting with it. A number of portraits by him survive, however, and are said to be "of decided merit."

Hesselius' son John, born in Philadelphia in 1728, was also a portrait painter, and was the instructor of Charles Wilson Peale, who painted the earliest original portrait of General Washington which exists.

Flavor of Food Not Affected by Years

Not many people have eaten, and enjoyed, a cake fifty years old, as was the case at a golden wedding banquet at Hollywood, but the record for ancient fare probably belongs to the Brussels antiquary who a few years ago invited some of his colleagues to a remarkable feast.

The bread at the Brussels banquet was made from wheat found in one of the Pyramids, believed to have been there three thousand years, and it was buttered with butter made in the reign of Queen Elizabeth.

Wine was served centuries old, recovered from a vault in Corinth, and included in the menu were apples 1,800 years old, discovered among the ruins of Pompeii.

A few years ago some members of the Zoological society of Ireland sampled eggs brought from China 30 years previously, which they declared to be quite good and of a delicate flavor—in parts.

Royalty on Show

The elaborate pomp that always attended France's former royal families is shown in "Versailles: Its Life and History," by Cecelia Hill. Devised to impress their subjects, it extended even to their meals, and the royal appetites received a publicity that became offensive. In the Salon du Grand Convert, a long room, connected with the king's dining room by a small door and narrow passages, "the queens of France," said Miss Hill, "ate their meals in incredible pomp, each dish, each drink being attended with almost as much ritual as the king's, and watched, too, by the public, anybody who was decently dressed being admitted to watch royalty eat. Energetic people did the round; watched the king as he ate his soup, were in time to see the queen eat entrees and hurried to the other side of the palace to gaze at princesses with dessert. Marie Antoinette, the bird in the gilded cage, found this custom so intolerable that she abolished it. But then, Marie Antoinette was a revolutionary."

Naked Truth

"L. is a cynical world, when viewed through the eyes of the modern child," said David Starr Jordan. "Children have a way of presenting the truth about their elders with ghastly clarity."

"Quite recently, when I boarded a train in San Francisco, a family group took the two seats in front of me. They spent several minutes in adjusting themselves but at last were settled. At this moment the little girl of the family stuck her head out the window and said to a group of friends on the platform: "We'll be gone in a minute and then you can talk about us and we'll talk about you."

Jutland in History

Jutland, a part of the kingdom of Denmark, was the home of the ancient Jutes, a Teutonic people akin to the Saxons. In early times many Jutes, like the Saxons, crossed to England and settled in the southern part of the island. It was off the coast of Jutland that on May 31, 1918, was fought the principal naval battle of the World war, resulting in the German high seas fleet being compelled to flee back to its protected base. This great fleet did not come out again until it came to surrender, according to the terms of the armistice of November 11, 1918.

Why Worry?

Lord Darling, a celebrated English barrister, was addressing the court when he became so engrossed in his case that he completely overlooked the fact that it was past time for adjournment. The court asked: "Mr. Darling, have you noticed the position of the hands of the clock?"

Darling—Yes, sir; but with respect, I see nothing to cause anxiety. They seem to me to be where they usually are at this time of the day.

Humming Bird No Singer

The humming bird has powerful muscles which drive the wings in rapid vibrations. These vibrations cause the humming sound. Most of the hummers have no song, their only notes being querulous squeaks of wrath or fear. A few of the tropical forms, nevertheless, are said to be slightly musical. The humming bird is the smallest of birds, and when stripped of its feathers is not larger than a bumblebee.

Union High School Is Defeated Before Board

More Names on Remonstrances Than on Petitions For The District.

The proposal for a union high school district was defeated today before the county boundary board, which found that in seven of the 10 districts so many names had been withdrawn that the petitions had been invalidated.

Remonstrances were ready for presentation bearing more names than those on the petitions, but those would not have stopped an election for decision upon the proposed district.

The proposal for a union high school stirred more interest than any local proposition that has been up for many years and some bitter feeling was engendered.

Many of those who withdrew their names for the petitions were more willing to pay a tuition to the Cottage Grove high school than to pay the added tax that a union district would bring.

The Cottage Grove board has expressed its intention to go as far as possible in caring for the high school students of adjoining districts. Heretofore no tuition has been charged, although the district legally can do so, and may find it necessary to do so in the future in order to meet expenses.

Proudfit Baby's Funeral Held.

Funeral services for Alvis Proudfit, three-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Russell Proudfit, were held at 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon at the Free Methodist church, Pastor Miles Pitcher officiating. The child died at midnight Monday, May 31, from intestinal influenza. He had been sick but a few days. Interment was in the A. F. & A. M. I. O. O. F. cemetery.

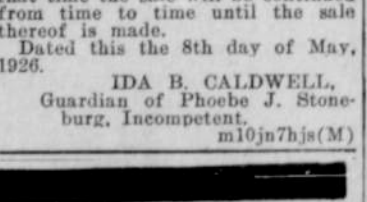
