Buster Keaton Night to Be Given

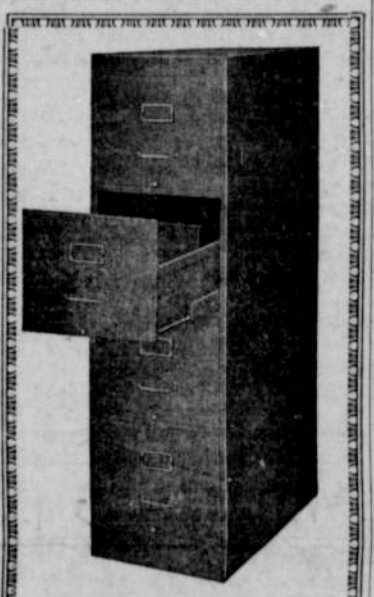
