American Nations Set Example for All World

Former Canadian Points to Undeclared Boundary Line of a Century.

"The Outlawry of War" was the subject taken Sunday forenoon by Pastor Cameron of the Presbyterian church for a patriotic address, the occasion being the Fourth of July.

Pastor Cameron, former subject of Canada and adopted subject of the United States, emphasized the fact that never has a gun frowned on the border line between the two nations. He declared that what these two peoples have done in keeping peace for over 100 years stands without parallel. "It was accomplished, not by spinless and spiritless people, but by two of the most foremost and most enterprising and most spirited peoples the world has ever known."

"For more than a century of turbulent years, restless years, while the border lines of every other country have been drenched with blood, the internationalism of North America has held and now gives an unbroken pledge of a far greater peace for all the world through a millennium yet to come."

"What these peoples have done should be the aim of Christian people for the nations of the world. All war is suicidal. It is a game in which both sides lose. Its horrors cannot be pictured by those who have not seen them, and those who have seen will not speak."

"The last war cost the world 250 billions of dollars, 64 more billions than the national wealth of America today. Let the world spend 250 billions for peaceful purposes and we shall see the reformation of every land. Give some of that money to the Christian church to propagate good will, and there will be a change in every home."

"The most searching question that can be asked today of a man or a nation is not, 'How much have you?' but rather, 'How did you get it?' It is a question that goes deeply to the very roots of our whole social problem, and probes to the heart our theories of life."

Solon White Speaks On Night Class Work

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 5.—Solon T. White, Smith-Hughes agricultural teacher in the Cottage Grove high school, attended the annual conference of agricultural teachers of Oregon held here July 1 to 3, when many vital problems of the profession were discussed and plans made for the next school year.

"Evening Classes With Adult Farmers," was the subject of an address by Mr. White. He told of the difficulties to be expected in organizing this work, as well as the great possibilities of such organization. The speaker said that he felt that the evening classes held last year near Cottage Grove were a success when follow-up observation revealed the fact that two new silos and 12 new poultry houses are being constructed and three bull associations have been formed.

Evening classes for adult farmers will be more numerous in the future, according to present policy. Successful work along this line in several localities has proved that there is a demand for the work. Part-time classes for boys out of school will receive more attention in the future also.

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Royal Annes Produce \$50 to Tree

(Salem Statesman.)

A Royal Anne cherry tree on the W. C. Conner place on Rural avenue in Salem has produced an even 625 pounds of cherries this year that were sold to the Hunt cannery for 8 cents a pound, or for an even \$50 check. And many cherries from the tree were eaten out of hand or were taken to supply the filling for cherry pies, and for other culinary delights.

Had Mr. Conner hired the picking done, he would have been obliged to pay 2 cents a pound, or \$12.50, leaving him net \$37.50. But he did not hire the picking done. He did it himself. He needed the exercise. It was as good as golf for him. So the picking cost him nothing, and he had the benefit of the exercise to boot.

The same tree has produced more than \$50 worth of cherries in a year. It has produced nearly as large number of pounds in seasons past when cherries sold for more than eight cents a pound. The tree is about 18 inches at the butt, and it has a great spread of limbs.

Conner, who is editor of the Northwest Poultry Journal and a former resident of Cottage Grove, has nothing on us. There are two Royal Anne trees on the Nelson Durham place on south Sixth street that also produced cherries this year to the amount of \$50 each. They are about 20 years of age and every year produce a large crop. There are also some large Bing cherries on the same place that are prolific bearers. This was formerly the Venske place.

New Carriers on Routes.

J. A. Powell started Thursday on his contract for carrying the mail on the Black Butte route, taking the place of C. A. Kurre. On the same day C. F. Counts took the place of J. N. Chapman as carrier on the Lorane route. C. A. Moore retains the Diston route.

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
