The other day a 19-year-old kid complained because he had to do a few odd jobs at home. "Can't a boy have time to rest once in a while? You folks seem to think that a kid ought to put in half his time working."

There was a boy, full enough of life if a dance were on; not a bit tired if his sweetie wanted him to hold her for an hour; he'd have been happy to demonstrate to her his wonderful staying qualities; his energy at its height; supple of muscle; a night's rest, if he would take it, would make him as good as new. But fifteen minutes of work seemed a mountain to him.

A few evenings ago we called at the home of E. G. O. Groat. He is aged over 90, about 92 or 93. He has spent a life at work. He lived his prime in an age when the only way to live was to work. There were no swift-moving automobiles to whisk one around. There were no movies at which to kill time. There were fewer ways to spend money, and there was less money to spend.

He was a preacher in Iowa and other central states and in those days a preacher was lucky to have enough to buy shoes for the kiddies and a new dress for the wife. He served his circuit on horseback, in rain and storm, in pleasant weather and bad, in warm weather or 40-below zero weather.

He is not as supple as he used to be. Several severe falls have made getting around only possible with a crutch and a cane. He has earned a life of ease for his remaining days. He might justly complain about being called upon to do a few jobs around the home.

"How are you feeling tonight, Brother Groat?"

"I haven't felt better for years. I'm superintending and helping dig a new well. It is going to be concrete, and I hope that will keep out the gophers and moles that dropped into the old one and spoiled the water."

"I want you to come and see my garden."

We went out to see the garden. A fine looking garden it is—as

large as two or three city lots. Potatoes, beans, corn and other vegetables were growing there and there were no weeds between the rows.

Elsewhere about the well kept yard there was evidence that one who loved to make the earth produce pretty and useful things had been at work with the hoe.

"Yes, I do all the work myself. You ought to see me hobbling along. I brace myself on my crutch and the hoe with which I work helps me support the other side. Wait a minute and I'll get the hoe and dig you a few potatoes to show you how it is done."

As we watched this contented old man handle himself and the hoe while supporting himself on a crutch, proud and happy to be able to do something useful, we could not help thinking of the 19-year-old, with energy to burn, who shrank before a few odd jobs that could take but a few minutes and could in no way tax his endurance.

Ninety-two was setting an example to make 19 ashamed of himself.

ALBANY COLLEGE.

There is a new building in Albany. It is made of brick, stone and concrete. It is made of dreams, ideals and pleadings. It is the new main building of Albany college. Though it cost less than \$100,000, its capacity is about that of a \$150,000 structure, for it will house the chief teaching and administrative activities of the school.

Albany college had a double commencement last Tuesday evening. It was a commencement for the college which is swinging into a new era of growth and usefulness. The commencement, held in the yet incomplete first unit of the group of buildings that ultimately will house the growing student body, was the first college function to be held there.

The graduates, too, commended unusual expectation. They are the products of a "self-help college." That is to say, Albany college promises each student, young man or woman, a minimum of six hours' work for pay a week. They all work. At the student's request the college will guarantee 18 hours of work a week. The money earned helps pay for education. Students find their chance to help themselves on the college farm, at clerical work in the college office and library, in dining room and kitchen service at the college commons, in restaurants and hotels, in cutting wood, in collecting and selling old newspapers and magazines, in moving lawns and working in homes, in garage work, salesmanship and any number of odd jobs.

People usually value attainment in proportion to the effort it requires. Young men and women who work for their education value it, and rarely misuse it. There can be no better equipment for life than trained hands, a disciplined mind and a pure purpose. Business men say they can judge character by what one does with his time. Character does not come alone from books or sympathy with the toiling masses of humanity altogether from class rooms.

Albany college is a Christian college. It is little enough to say that Christian education is training of the mind with the inspiration of ideal added. It is a preparation for public service, for home building, for business, industry or the professions that contains a solvent for social and economic problems.

It means much to Oregon that she has Albany college with its ideals of self help and Christian education.
