Counties May Not Get O. & C. Lands Refund

President Coolidge Said to Be in Doubt as to Advisability of Signing.

Portland, Ore., July 7.—A special dispatch to the Morning Oregonian from Washington tonight said:

Confident expectation of Oregon members of congress that President Coolidge will sign the bill reimbursing 18 counties for taxes lost on Oregon and California railroad grant lands, was clouded today by the news that ex-Governor William Spry of Utah, commissioner of the general land office, had stood by his recommendation opposing the measure at a conference with the president shortly before the latter left on his vacation trip.

There were other indications that Mr. Coolidge has some doubt about the propriety of refunding taxes to the Oregon counties at this time.

Bright Sun Causes Crash.

A car driven by Wilson Little of this city and one driven by Miss Jessie Hazelton of Longview, Wash., collided yesterday afternoon at the Main and Seventh streets intersection. Little probably was blinded by the bright sun, against which he was driving. The tourist car was traveling east on Main street and the Little car, traveling west, turned south on Seventh street and struck the front end of the other car. Chief of Police Pitcher decided that Little was at fault and Little made settlement for the damages, which were slight.
