Parchment Is to Bring Much Publicity to C. G.

out of the state, returns to Salem, Miss Mack will carry the parchment to the capitol. Her party will be met at Jefferson, 14 miles south of Salem, by Governor Pierce, Secretary of State Koser and an escort of state traffic officers. Pictures will be taken as the governor and secretary affix their signatures and affix the great seal of the state. Miss Mack and her party will proceed to Portland and will be met at the city boundaries by Mayor Baker and an escort of Portland traffic officers, who will conduct her to the Oregonian office, where she will deliver the parchment to that newspaper, which will start it on its long journey after it has been placed on exhibition for a day or two.

The parchment carries the following message:
 "Greetings: In the heart of the holy land and in the state of Oregon there grows a tree known as the myrtle—ofttimes called holy wood.

"Framed in this rare 'holy wood' I am sending this parchment to Hollywood, and on its journey it will visit every state in the union to receive the official seals and signatures of the executives of each commonwealth. This unique document will complete its long trip at the joyous yuletide season and will be sold to raise funds to bring cheer and happiness to the hearts of the unfortunate in the motion picture capital of the world."

Never in history has such a parchment been prepared and signed by the governors of all states and by the president of the United States. Nor is there any document bearing all these signatures. It is the custom of collectors, including the libraries of state universities and other public organizations, to send to state capitals to obtain copies of the state seals, and it is believed that this parchment, bearing all seals and signatures, will be of rare value to such institutions.

Already plans have been laid by Miss Mack to conduct the parchment on the last few laps of its journey. As it approaches Salt Lake city, her home town, she will fly there from Hollywood and will present the parchment to Utah state executives for their signatures. Thence she will take it to Carson City, Nev., and from there to Sacramento for the last of the 48 state seals. Then on to Los Angeles, where Miss Mack will be met by Mayor George Cryer, state and other civic officials.

Freak Rock Sculpture Work of Dame Nature

On the Cornish coast of England, Dame Nature has excelled in the art of sculpture in the number of faces she has carved in the rock by means of wind and wave and weather. Every visitor to Land's end is taken to a certain point of vantage where can be seen the rugged features of Doctor Johnson, but in this case a little imagination is required. Far better is the remarkable likeness of Queen Victoria on the north coast of Cornwall. At Redruth steps, in the Queen Elizabeth rock, rises majestically out of the sands. Every motorist through the lake district sees the lion and the lamb, on the summit of a mountain near Grassmere. The lion especially looks as well carved as one of the Landseer lions in Trafalgar square. Strangely enough, approaching from the other side, two or three miles beyond, another rock on the same mountain takes precisely the same form, and on coming closer this rock changes to what is called "The Lady at the Organ." This is a great rock in the shape of an organ, at which sits a woman with outstretched hands, as though producing "the sound of a great amen."

Exposure to Cold Not Harmful in Still Air

Professor Bancroft's heart beat and blood flow test on naked persons in the extreme cold of ten degrees below the freezing point suggests the question: What degree of cold can the unclad human body withstand? Perhaps the most surprising experiment in this direction was made during the international circumpolar expedition in 1882-3. In charge of the northern Siberian station, clad only in his nightshirt, left his tent for a stroll in the open air when the temperature was 72 degrees below freezing point, and he was none the worse for it! This result was explained by the fact that during the promenade not a breath of air was stirring. Had there been a breeze (the terrible blizzard of that region), with its dense, blinding, and suffocating cloud of ice needles, it would have meant instantaneous death.

Organ Built of Bamboo

Tuneful melodies of sweet, well-rounded tone still flow from the pipes of a bamboo organ built into the church at Las Pinas in the Philippines more than 110 years ago by the Augustinian fathers. This instrument is constructed wholly of bamboo cut from a jungle near the church. The builders treated the bamboo to make it impervious to the elements. The pipes were buried in sand for six months for seasoning and hardening as a protection against the atmosphere and white ants, which attack nearly all wooden articles in that climate. In 1863 and again in 1882 the organ was damaged, the first time by an earthquake and the second time by a typhoon which blew off the roof of the church. It was silent for 29 years until in 1911 Father Faniel, a Belgian missionary, had it repaired, and since that time it has been in constant service.

History of Suez Canal

The Suez canal, 92 miles long, connecting the Red sea and the Mediterranean, was built by a stock company organized in 1854 by the French engineer, De Lesseps. Work was commenced in 1859 and November 16, 1869, the canal was opened in the presence of the emperor of Austria, the empress of the French and the khedive of Egypt. The cost of the undertaking was somewhat more than \$100,000,000. The canal is a sea-level canal and its completion reduced the sea voyage from London to India more than 8,500 miles. In 1875 the British government purchased the khedive's interest in the canal for about \$20,000,000, and now owns the controlling interest. —Kansas City Times.
