The maximum temperature was reached on July 10 when 105 degrees was recorded, probably the record for heat in this vicinity. The minimum temperature for the month, 36 degrees, was reached on July 8. The mean maximum for the month was 85 degrees and the mean minimum 64.4. The mean was 65.7.
