## Sent to Destruction Over Niagara Falls

At least three vessels have gone over Niagara falls, says the Boston Globe in reply to a query. The first was in 1827, when an old craft was sent over with a bear, a buffalo, a dog and some geese as passengers. The bear jumped from the boat before it reached the rapids, and swam to the shore and was rescued. The geese went over the falls and came to the shore below alive, while the other animals were not seen.

Another vessel, the Detroit, that had belonged to Commodore Perry's fleet, was started over the cataract in the winter of 1841, but grounded midway in the rapids, and was finally broken up by the ice.

In 1837 a burning vessel was sent down the rapids and over the falls. This was described as a most magnificent sight.

## Ice Age May Return

There is no way of telling whether the ice age, so called, will return or what changes in the climate will occur in the future. It is known that the ice sheet invaded the northern part of the United States four or five times, and between these several invasions there were long intervals, during which the climate was as mild as now, and in some cases milder than it is at present. It is also known that the length of each of these interglacial stages was longer than the time which had elapsed since the appearance of the last ice sheet. From this it may be inferred that it is quite possible, at least, that another advance of the great ice sheet may occur.

When Mr. Thomas bumped the window he was thrown backward by the force of the impact, while the window glass went forward onto the street. No one was injured by the falling glass, neither was Mr. Thomas injured.

The ears are already seven or eight inches in length and probably will be a foot in length when ripe. Of course this corn doesn't compare in size with that grown in the central states, but makes a good showing for a section in which it was claimed 20 years ago that corn could not be made to grow at all.

Funeral services were held August 11 at the Methodist church at Drain and interment was in the A. F. & A. M. I. O. O. F. cemetery at Cottage Grove.

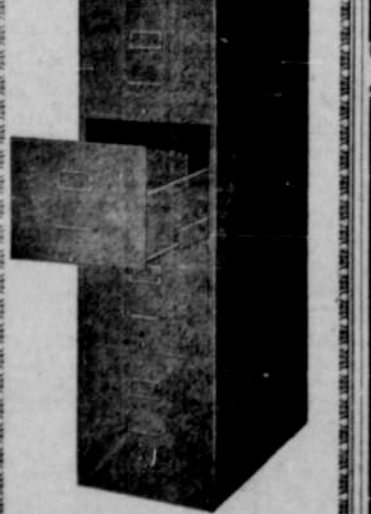
## N. W. White Building Destroyed.

## STATE NOT TO GET IN ON O. & C. TAX REFUND

(Roseburg News-Review.)

It has been wisely decided that the money to be paid by the federal government to eighteen counties as reimbursement for lost taxes on the revested O. & C. R. R. land grant is to be officially designated as an "appropriation," not as "refunded taxes." The average layman will attach no importance to such a distinction, but the farsighted county attorneys who met in Roseburg a few days ago, saw the need of averting a possible division of the money with the state, which took no part in supporting the Stanfield bill and which has been paid every dollar of state taxes levied upon the counties during the ten-year period covered by the forthcoming reimbursement. Coming to the counties as an "appropriation," the federal money will be for the counties alone, whereas as "refunded taxes" the money would have to be shared with the state, which morally, at least, isn't entitled to a dollar of it.

## DANGER OF SHORTAGE OF WATER IS AVERTED

Any danger of shortage of water in the city has been averted by the operation of a gasoline pump in Layng creek to assist the Dinner creek and Prayther creek intakes. During all of last week the pump was operated night and day. By Friday the city's million gallon reservoir was overflowing and the pump will be operated daytimes only unless there should again be danger of a shortage. The consumption of water remains at about a million gallons daily.
