Stolen Jewelry Is Oddly Returned

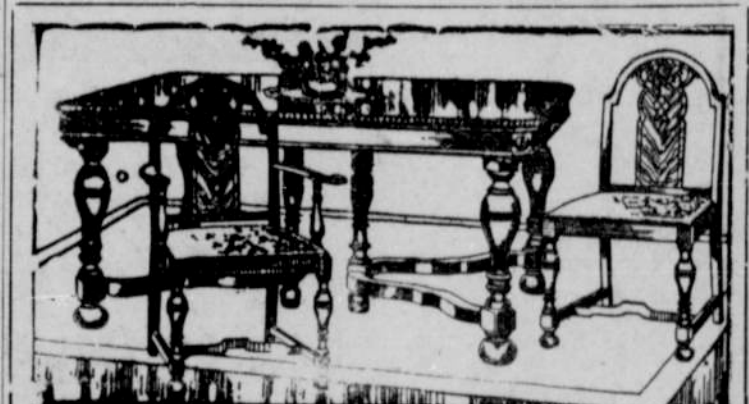

More poison was used last month than for the two months from Mt. 15 to July 15, the county agent said. Land owners are urged to keep up the poison work as large numbers of the gray diggers are coming out of the hills now onto farm and orchard lands.
