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INGALLS ON LOVE.

The usually sane and sensible editor of the Corvallis Gazette-Times, who no doubt would have been a model for the Venus de Milo had he been of the weaker but more forceful sex, takes exception to some erudite observations made by the Eugene Register and The Sentinel upon the subject of easy divorce.

This editorial by Ingalls is an unusual one to come from his pen. In his opening paragraph he admits ignorance of the subject which he is about to discuss. This is the first time we have known him to admit ignorance about anything, especially about anything in which the gentler sex is even remotely concerned. Such an admission by Ingalls is refutation of the oft-repeated statement that the world is getting worse. Instead it must be getting decidedly better. The moral surroundings of the agricultural college must be improving when Ingalls makes such admission.

Not only does Ingalls make a straight forward, open and frank admission of his ignorance of his subject, but during the course of a column editorial he makes a display that marks his admission as an unusually truthful statement to have come from such a source.

In the concluding paragraph of this amazing discussion of a subject upon which the editor is so completely uninformed and misinformed, Ingalls says:

We refer lightly to "love's young dream," as though it were something of a weakness, or an

accident or a mere animal impulse. It is the most beautiful dream in the world—if one doesn't waken. Nature's greatest mystery; civilization's hope; mankind's happiest thrill and greatest source of contentment; the foundation of the home, existence, morality, government; balm of hurt hearts wounded in life's fierce struggle; honey from heaven's own flowers; the antidote of grief; promiser of happiness; encouragement of effort; applauder of success; sustainer of interest; stimulant of ambition; comforter in bad luck and failure; medicine in ill health; smoother of life's pathway; solace in distress, life's greatest source of happiness—and misery. Men have died for it; women died for it; kingdoms sacrificed for it; reputations lost for it and because of it have been committed all manner of crimes, all deeds of heroism, all species of sacrifice. Its possession is all the heaven needed on earth; its loss is life's supreme tragedy. Reason cannot stop its approach nor halt its going, therefore very few marriages result from a reasoning to the effect that if it doesn't last—there is the divorce court.

In an editorial in a preceding issue of the same paper appeared an editorial in which Ingalls criticized Editor Humorous Hume of the Portland Spectator for urging the Volstead editor of the Oregonian to take the pledge and to dispose of his menagerie of pink elephants, green monkeys and yellow snakes.

If Editor Humorous Hume has seen the foregoing paragraph from the pen of Editor Ingalls, he will know that it would be useless to urge Editor Ingalls to follow the advice so generously given the Volstead editor of the Oregonian.

ELIOT AND VALENTINO.

The Eugene Register discusses intelligently the relativity of news values that gives to the death of Endolph Valentino searchings in the daily papers while the passing of Charles W. Eliot, president emeritus of Harvard, is given the world in modest form.

While the life of Eliot was long and useful and his services to humanity by far the greater, the manner of the death of Valentino, his death at the beginning of a career, his place in the hearts of motion picture devotees, gave news value that was not in the death of President Eliot at a ripe age with no unusual attendant circumstances.

But who of the two would make the best news story 50 years from now?

Eliot's five-foot shelf of books will be read for untold centuries. Six months from now the name of the great shiek of the movies will appear no more on the silver screen. When a movie star dies his pictures no longer sell.

Fifty years from now no school kid will be able to tell who Valentino was, while the name of Eliot will be a comparatively familiar one among the educated.

Valentino was greater in death so far as news stories were concerned, but Eliot is by far the greater after death and the disparity will become greater with the passing years.

Valentino was a great entertainer while he lived and gave us much pleasure. We would not take from him the fame so justly his due. But those who merely entertain us for the moment we soon forget.

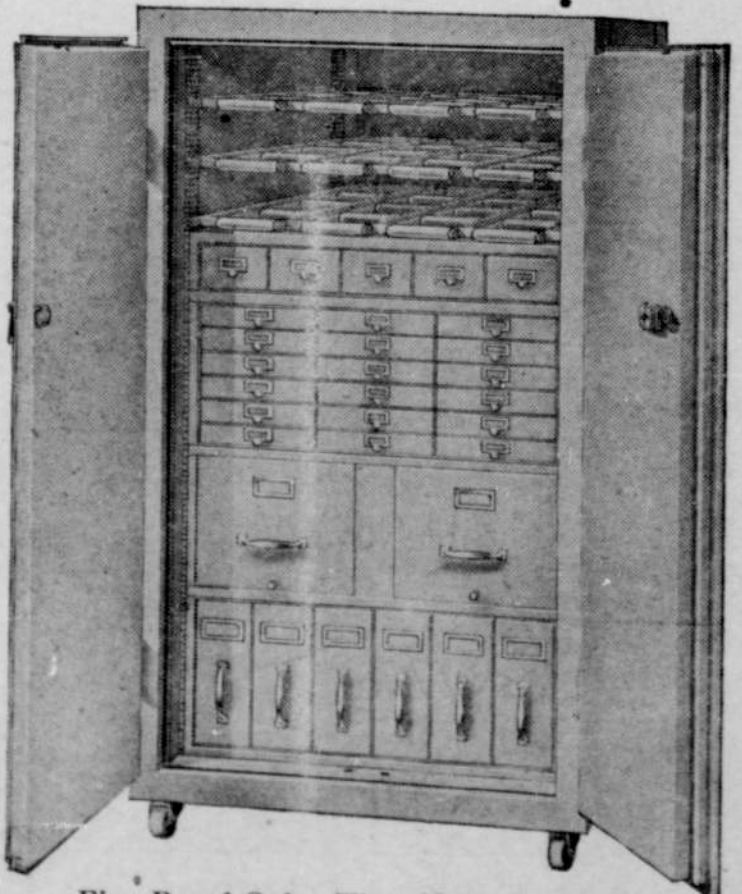
