War Cry Tells Story Of Calapooya Outing

The current issue of "The War Cry," Salvation Army publication, carries a story on the annual children's outing held by the Salvation Army the latter part of July at Calapooya springs. The encampment was attended by 142, of whom 124 were from Portland and other Willamette valley cities.

Part of the story follows: "Cottage Grove, ten miles from Calapooya, proved a generous host to the Salvation Army camp. When the final day of the outing arrived, a motor truck for baggage and twelve cars for passengers arrived to convey the party to the station, these being furnished by business men at the request of Pastor D. P. Cameron of the Presbyterian church. The American Legion post members, accompanied by their wives, drove to camp for a bonfire evening party, taking all the ice cream and cake the young people could consume. The Lions club also gave an entertainment and arrived accompanied by a truckload of watermelons. A kindly farmer also donated a sheep."

The children were transported to the camp through the courtesy of John M. Scott, assistant passenger traffic manager of the Southern Pacific, who placed a special car at their disposal.

Bad Check Men Get In Good Work Here And One Is Caught

Tell Plausible Tale of Having Been Employed as Carpenters at Saginaw.

Were to Work on New City Hall and Started to Fit Up Stag Quarters.

Jackson, but Jackson did not care to be spoken to and walked from the west side of the store, where he was making his purchase, around to the east side and out of the entrance on that side. The police officer had suspected that Jackson would attempt to escape, probably by the rear door on Seventh street, and as Pitcher hurried to the corner of the building to watch the rear door, Jackson evidently slipped out behind Pitcher's back. Seeing that their quarry had escaped, Pitcher and Smith hurried east on Main street, fortunately in the right direction, and overtook their man. Upon the demand of Smith he at once paid back the money and remonstrated when the police officer insisted on placing him under arrest. He probably would not have been so easily taken had he realized that paying back the money on the check would not give him his liberty. As a matter of fact he returned to Smith more than he had received, for he paid the face of the check while a charge for groceries had been deducted when the check was cashed. The "profit" has been turned over to Chief of Police Pitcher to be used, together with \$65 found on Jackson, in making pro rata repayment to those who were victimized. All the goods "sold" have been recovered.

Jackson said that he and his partner had split their "earnings" 50-50, which was the reason he had only \$65.

When placed under arrest, Jackson said he would take the police officers to the home of Lind, for whom the men said they had worked, and demand that Lind make the checks good. With Officer McFarland at the wheel of his car, and Pitcher and Jackson in the rear seat, a trip was made to Saginaw and a short distance out the Delight valley road. The prisoner probably expected to find an opportunity to make his escape. They were unable to find the Lind house and when Jackson, in reply to questions by Pitcher, showed ignorance of the country in that section, Pitcher decided it was time to return to the city and put his man in jail. He has since been sent to the county jail.

Some bad checks were passed at Eugene Thursday and two men whose descriptions tally with those of the two men who operated here, camped at Walker Friday, so it is the belief of Chief Pitcher that the same men passed the checks at Eugene.

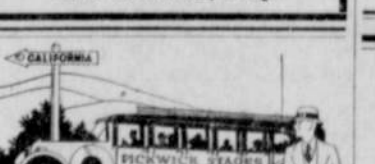

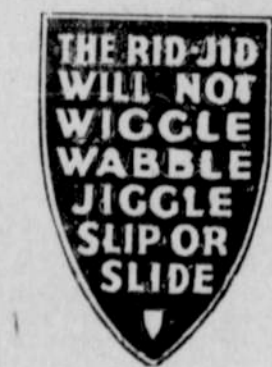
