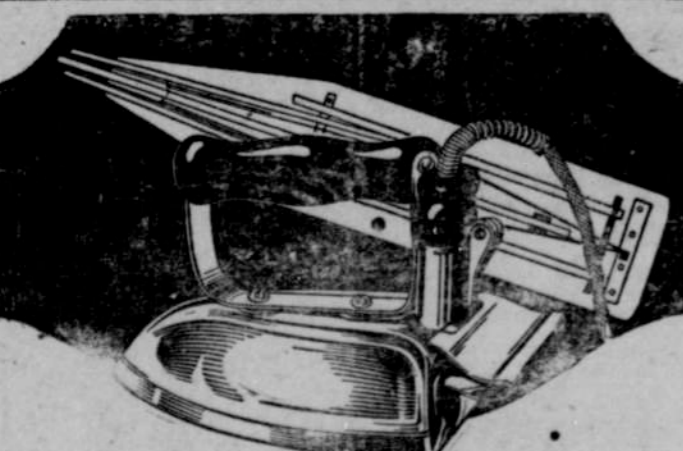

South Lorane Highway Is Added Scenic Route

Motorists looking for new roads to conquer are trying the south Lorane road. This piece of highway has been rocked to the top of the mountain from this side and on the other side it has been ditched and the ruts smoothed out. For those out for pleasure and to see new country, the trip over this road is a pleasant one. The grade on the other side of the mountain is narrow, so that fast driving is dangerous, and there are many sharp turns on narrow grades that made cautious driving necessary. Several parties from here made the trip over this road yesterday, making the complete loop by either going or returning by the north Lorane road, which is in excellent condition. The mile or so of road from the foot of the mountain to the stores at Lorane remains in the rough condition that has characterized it for a number of years, but otherwise this road is in first class condition. The north and south highway at Lorane has been moved a short distance east of its former location and does not pass the stores as it formerly did.
