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THE BIBLE IN OUR SCHOOLS.

We can not fathom opposition to READING of the bible as part of school work. The Sentinel would oppose as strongly as anyone the teaching of any doctrine, or an attempt on the part of teachers to interpret the bible, but in these jazy days our kids learn little about the bible anywhere else, and we feel that no one should grow to manhood or womanhood ignorant of what it contains. Our kids are allowed to freely read far-from-truth stories in highly illustrated magazines decorated with pictures of the feminine in all degrees of nudity. Surely no one can claim that bible stories will do more harm than these salacious so-called confession stories that appeal to sensual and baser nature, which they are permitted to read, while no one will dispute that the bible, the great light of all ages, contains a correct rule and guide for all our actions. CITY VACATION NOTICE.

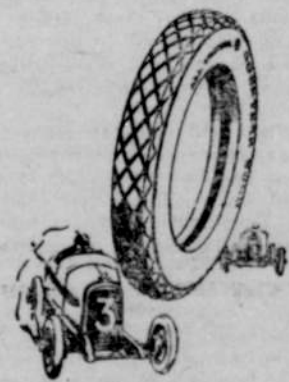

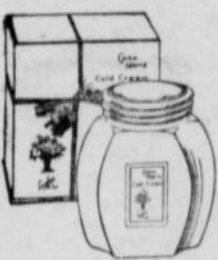
