Mrs. Nancy Burch, an old time resident of this city, died Tuesday at her home in Portland after an illness of several weeks. She was 84 years old.

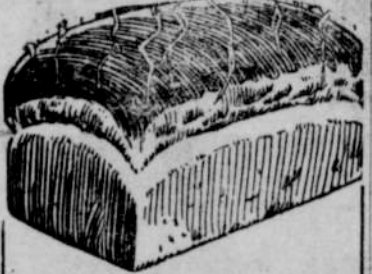
Galloway writes insurance. Mrs. A. C. Hawkins returned last week from Portland, where she visited two weeks.
