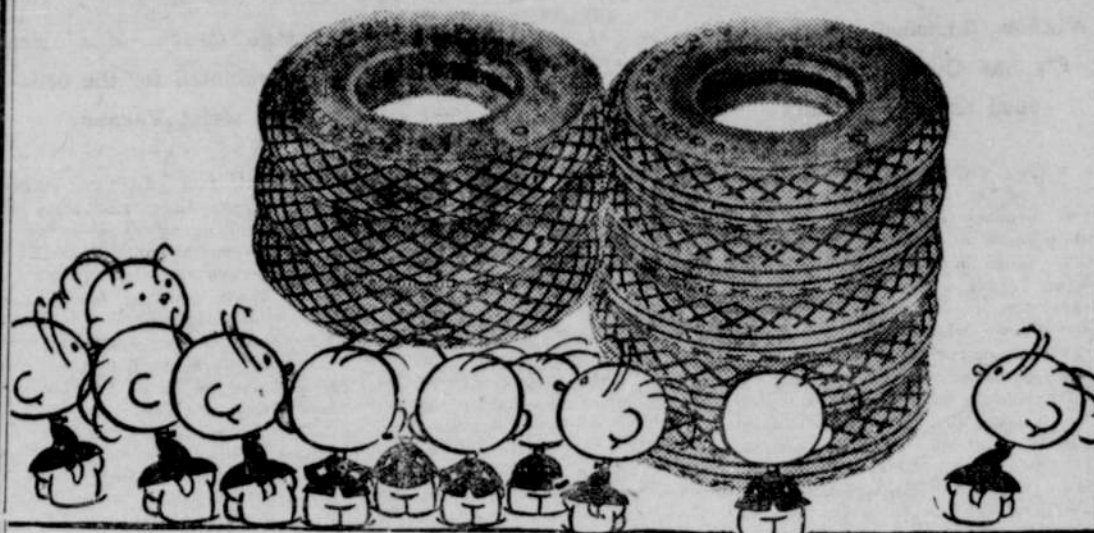
special male quartet sang "The Wayside Cross" and a women's duet gave "The Old Rugged Cross."
