## ELECTRICITY ON FARMS.

James T. Jardine, director of ex-  
periment station work at Oregon  
Agricultural college, sends report  
for 1926 of the Oregon committee  
on relation of electricity to agri-  
culture, of which Dr. Jardine is  
chairman. The report is by George  
W. Kable, forty eight pages.

From his report, knowledge of  
how greatly farm operations are  
aided by electricity may be gained.  
The work started in 1924. The  
number of purposes for which  
energy is used reveals how estab-  
lished power and light companies  
are successfully extending service  
to the farms. Also it shows how  
makers of unit plants for generat-  
ing are covering the field in  
Oregon.

Ten thousand of the 50,000 farms  
in Oregon are supplied either from  
lines of power companies or from  
individual units on the farm. It  
is stated that more than 10 per  
cent of Oregon farms are equipped  
to use "juice." The electric  
motor does not require an engineer  
as do steam engines. This saves  
time, labor, repairs, and is more  
economical from all angles.

Among the uses enumerated in  
the committee report are: Thrash-  
ing, wood sawing, grain cleaning,  
irrigation, silo filling, shearing  
sheep and goats, elevation of grain,  
water heating, feed grinding, ma-  
chine milking, cream separating,  
lighting of poultry houses, and  
electric incubation.

One can visualize progress in  
Oregon when it is noted that 5,000  
farms in this state are supplied  
with electric service by rural dis-  
tribution lines of public utility  
companies, in contrast with On-  
tario, Canada, where, according to  
the survey of Professor A. E.  
Stewart of the University of Minn-  
esota, only 2.52 per cent of farms  
are served. Oregon stands far in  
the lead.

This seems to prove the unwise  
character of the effort by Oregon  
politicians, under guise of the  
Housewives' Council "water and  
power board development measure,"  
to plunge this state into debt for  
duplication of existing electric  
energy plants and irrigation pro-  
motion.

## COUNTRY EDITOR IS APPRE- CIATED.

On another page of this issue, a  
number of the leading editors of  
the state tell us what they think  
will happen to the senatorial and  
gubernatorial candidates in the  
election on November 2. It is the  
custom of The Spectator to turn  
to the so-called "country editor"  
for instruction and enlightenment  
on the important questions of the  
day. Better than does his fellow  
journalist of the big cities, he  
knows what the people are think-  
ing, what they are talking about,  
and how they are likely to vote.  
He knows intimately more people  
than does the metropolitan editor,  
whose cabinet is composed of a  
very small circle of advisors.  
Everybody in his territory talks  
to, confers with, and advises the  
country editor, who leads and re-  
flects public opinion in a way and  
to an extent that are quite im-  
possible to the metropolitan editor.  
The "country editor" is so-  
called because he owns and edits  
his paper outside the "big city";  
the editors of the big city are  
rarely if ever the owners of the  
papers they edit. I think the  
country editors have a greater  
sense of their responsibility to their  
readers and a higher and more dar-  
ing spirit of independence than  
have their fellow-editors of the  
city. To be able to say what you  
think without instructions as to  
what you should think and how  
you must say it, is, in my humble  
opinion, the thing that distinguishes  
the freeman from his shackled and  
muzzled brother and from the  
henchmen of the field that perish.

## MAGLADRY IS ENDORSED.

(Eugene Guard.)  
J. S. Magladry, who is a candi-  
date for reelection as state sena-  
tor from Lane county, worked con-  
sistently and effectively during his  
previous service in the legislature  
in behalf of legislation desired and  
sponsored by the farming interests.  
Thus he had charge of the anti-  
oleomargarine bill and the bill to  
require an increase in the cream  
content of ice cream, and obtained  
their passage. He obtained, at the  
request of Lane county dairymen,  
passage of a bill providing for com-  
pulsory inspection of cattle for  
tuberculosis in this county. He  
voted favorably on all farm mea-  
sures submitted before the legis-  
lature. His record of service in be-  
half of the farmers, like his record  
in behalf of the University of  
Oregon and Lane county generally,  
is one of effort and achievement.  
On the record he is entitled to re-  
election and should be reelected.

**Wiese Brothers to Continue.**

Cedar creek and will be able to  
continue operations during the  
winter. When this is out the mill  
probably will be moved. They  
finished sawing Tuesday on the

avenue, Gibbs avenue and a short

enacted by the council Monday  
night. A dozen ordinances were  
also passed for numerous short  
pieces of concrete sidewalk over  
the city, and one lateral sewer dis-  
trict was formed and one sewer  
assessment ordinance adopted.

The ruins of the Thomas building  
on south River road were reported  
to be dangerous and a nuisance and  
their removal will be ordered.
