Lane Cottage Nearing Completion.

The Lane county cottage on the W. C. T. U. children's farm out from Corvallis is nearing completion and will be ready for children December 1. The cottage will make room for 20 boys. Other counties are following in the footsteps of Lane and Multnomah. Coos and Clackamas have started their campaigns and four southern Oregon counties, Douglas, Josephine, Jackson and Klamath, are uniting to provide a cottage from that section.

Skidmore Is Recovering.

Walter Skidmore, who has been critically ill from blood poisoning for two weeks in a Eugene hospital, has passed the crisis and is on the way to recovery, according to the latest reports from his physician. He is expected to be able to leave the hospital within 10 days or two weeks. Sawmill Resumes Operation.

The Kerr sawmill on Diston route in the Mosby creek section resumed operations Friday after being shut down ten days while improvements were made and new machinery installed. A quarter of mile of chute was built and a new edger was added to the mill's machinery. The mill capacity is 15,000 to 20,000 feet. It is planned to operate the mill during the entire winter.
