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**NEWSPAPERS AND CORRUPT
 PRACTICES.**

Quite a hullabaloo is being stirred up by a few newspapers of the state because of the fact that the Oregonian, in its issue published on election day, carried editorials advising the electorate how to cast their ballots. We are gravely informed by Bend, Pendleton and other papers that this is a serious infraction of the corrupt practices act.

The Pendleton East Oregonian correctly states that the corrupt practices act makes it unlawful for any person at any place on the day of an election to ask, solicit or in any manner try to influence anyone's vote for any candidate or any measure under consideration at that election.

By straining the law a little that may mean that any newspaper is forbidden to circulate on election day any news or editorial matter that might influence a voter.

If such is the meaning of the law, and we do not say that it isn't, the Oregonian is not its only violator. It is customary for morning newspapers, published many hours before the polls are open, to carry their regular advice to the electorate. It is even more common for newspapers published the day before election to carry such advice, and a large part of the circulation of such evening papers, the Oregon Journal, for one, does not reach its readers until after the polls open the following day.

Why in the name of common sense, we ask, is it more of a crime to carry advice to voters in a morning paper, a part of whose circulation reaches the readers after

the polls are open, than for an evening paper printed the day before to do the same thing?

So far as we know, the Sentinel has not been criticized for carrying in its Monday evening issue advice on men and measures. Should the Sentinel have been denied the privilege of saying on Monday to those who received the paper Monday what some papers would not have the voters read on election day?

We do not believe that it is the intent of the corrupt practices act to limit the press in the manner that some newspapers setting themselves up as election purists would have the press limited, but if such is the purpose and intent of the law, let us carry it to its logical conclusion.

If the law is as these purists would have it, then a newspaper having readers so situated that their paper does not reach them for two or three days is forbidden to publish anything for two or three days before election that might influence voters.

On telephone poles of Cottage Grove we yet find prominently displayed the pictures of Senator Stanford. Follow the law to the conclusion that these political purists set up and Senator Bob would have been required to get up bright and early Tuesday morning and remove every one of these cards from the telephone poles of the state.

Throughout election day there were displayed in the windows of the business houses of Cottage Grove, and in the business houses of every other city of the state, various cards designed to influence voters for or against men and measures. If the corrupt practices act means what these election purists say it means, these business houses were grossly violating the corrupt practice act.

And what about the voters' pamphlet? That contains more reading intended to influence the voter than any issue of any newspaper. Most of the little reading the pamphlet gets probably is done on election day. Shall we, to please these election purists, have the secretary of state call these pamphlets in on the day before election?

And what about the slogans on the ballot itself? These slogans are designed for the purpose of influencing voters. Shall we permit the unaccounted voter to seek his sacred booth only to be confronted by this flagrant abuse of the corrupt practices act?

Followed to the conclusion that these election purists would have us follow it, the corrupt practices act would get us into quite a mess. Thank goodness that in Oregon there is almost no malicious intent to violate the spirit of the corrupt practices act. It has been a long time since there has been anything in connection with our elections with which even these editorial illies could find any serious fault.

Heavier Eugene Team Defeats Cottage Grove

Locals Put Up Gamy Fight
 Against Odds While
 Losing 38 to 0.

Outweighed many pounds to the man but not outgamed nor outplayed, Cottage Grove lost to Eugene 38 to 0 Saturday on Hayward field in Eugene. The heavy Eugene line and backfield overwhelmed the Cottage Grove forward line. The game was hard fought, with the locals battling every minute and had the Cottage Grove eleven been heavier a different score would have been on record.

Billy McCargar, Cottage Grove halfback, was kicked in the head when he made a tackle in the first quarter and had to be taken from the game. He was out of his head for some time and it was feared that the injury was serious but he is able to attend school today. This is the second serious injury this season.

Cottage Grove made yardage twice. The first was made in the second quarter after the locals had recovered a Eugene fumble. They penetrated to Eugene's 31-yard line but were held then on downs. In the fourth quarter Swanson made yardage on a spinner play. Eugene made 26 points in the first half and 12 in the second. The locals showed up better in the second half than did Eugene.

The Eugene Register says of the Cottage Grove quarterback: "Glen Swanson accounted for most of the territory gained by the Grove aggregation and displayed good headwork in running the team. He is only 14 years old and weighs 115 pounds in his football togs."

Cottage Grove's secondary defense was good and stopped all plays that got away from the line.

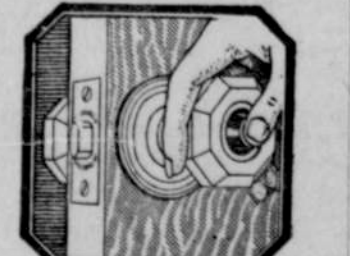
