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DOESN'T KNOW BETTER.

The Eugene Guard finds fault with the Oregon Journal because ten days before election the Journal published a news story in which it stated that Haney and Stanfield were running neck and neck for the United States senatorship, with Steiwer trailing behind. In the light of subsequent events, it is quite evident that such was not the case, and the Guard charges the Journal with falsifying its news columns for the purpose of promoting the interests of its democratic candidate, Mr. Haney.

The Guard waxes warm in its condemnation of such tactics as follows:

The Journal, ten days before the election just held, published with all possible prominence on its first page a pretended news story concerning the political situation.

This was not published as the opinion of a writer, but as unqualified fact, as "the consensus of unbiased political opinion." All who are informed know that there has not been at any time any consensus of opinion, unbiased or partisan, that Steiwer would be "trailing behind" both Haney and Stanfield. The man who wrote the story was not to blame. He wrote what he was told to write, of course. But the editors of the Journal knew when they published that story that they were falsifying their news columns. When a newspaper deliberately falsifies its news, how can its advocates be taken seriously?

While it is quite evident that the Journal was in error, the

Sentinel is inclined to believe that the Guard is a trifle harsh in its denunciation. The editor of the Sentinel, in responding to a request from a Portland publication, stated the case exactly as it was, as subsequent events have shown. The Guard was correct in its prediction of what the situation was 10 days before election.

But because The Sentinel and the Guard were familiar with the situation and were able to give their readers correct information, does not prove that the Journal deliberately falsified its news columns when it stated otherwise.

The Sentinel is inclined to believe that the Journal was merely showing its ignorance of the true situation. Blinded by its partisanship, obsessed with pride over its achievement in egging Stanfield into becoming an independent candidate, not equipped by inclination or otherwise to get close to the electorate, and kidded along by the unreliable ones which it permits to advise it, the Journal probably believed that it was telling the truth, at least as near the truth as is expected in a political campaign.

Of course such colossal ignorance is hardly excusable but it seems to be suited to the general conduct of the Journal in any and all political contests.

If ignorance is bliss, as has been repeatedly stated by wise ones, the Journal should be supremely and exultantly happy, but we appeal to the Guard not to charge with deliberate falsification a newspaper which has ever stood by the weak and the down-trodden and has ever endeavored to raise them to higher levels, to nobler and better things, by an appeal to their baser passions.

75 MEMBERS EXPECTED

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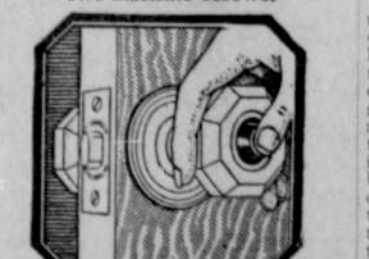
