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SCHOLASTIC REBELS.

"Student Society Out to Get Swan" is a display head on the first page of the Eugene Register. Swan is a high school principal of Eugene.

Why are the students out to get him? Here are the facts, as stated by Principal Swan, who is wholeheartedly supported by the school board:

One student who has been on the football team has been found to be ineligible because of having passed his twenty-first birthday. Another has been found to be ineligible because he is a resident of Idaho, in addition to being delinquent with his tuition fees.

To attempt to use students that are manifestly ineligible would subject the Eugene high school to expulsion from Oregon State Athletic association.

To attempt to use ineligible players is the poorest of sportsmanship.

Those of us who have felt that the schools give too much attention to sports, have been informed, and sincerely so, that sports bring out the best there is in pupils, that it makes them clean and red-blooded, that it develops a spirit that will be ready for a clean battle with the world, yet the action of Principal Swan has resulted in desecration of the school building, of threats of students to strike, of threats not to play on

the football team, of personal inconveniences to Principal Swan, such as playfully putting sand into the crankcase of his motor car.

It is now a test as to whether the students shall rule the school or whether the principal and school board shall rule. The students have held one or more indignation rallies and from among their number a secret society has been formed whose purpose is "to get Swan."

One of the ineligible players, when asked why he came to Eugene high, replied that he came to play football. Evidently there are a number of others who came for almost any purpose except that of education, and are getting everything else except a training for decent citizenship.

We are spending nearly 50 per cent of our tax money on education and here is an example of what little appreciation for too many show for the sacrifices others are making for them, and here is the example that far too many give of the uselessness of spending money on them. To a large extent it must be said, in justice to the children, they reflect the attitude of their elders.

Of course those who faithfully pursue their studies are not to be condemned for the actions of these few, and the opportunity for an education should not be denied those who seriously pursue their studies, but if the taxpayer is to be kept good natured, these lads who have staged these disgraceful affairs in Eugene must be summarily dealt with, regardless of whether their parentage is high or low, and the school authorities will be actively supported in such action by all students who are deserving of an education.

The first thing a child should learn, the first thing he needs to learn, if he is to become a success in his after life, is respect for the constituted authorities, and here is something to be firmly impressed upon all students: Even though Principal Swan should be wrong, this rebelliousness is not justifiable. The law provides a method for righting wrongs, a dignified and lawful way of doing so. The student who leads a rebellious protest such as that in the Eugene school, is emulating the moonshiner and bootlegger who rebel at laws that prohibit them from plying their nefarious business.

These high school boys are rebelling because their principal will not permit them to do what is against the law of amateur sport. A pretty example of sports they are. They are making sport of sports. Splendid examples of citizens they will make when they openly defy the right and would punish the one who upholds the right. "We will show Superintendent Jones where to head in, just as we have shown Principal Swan where to head in," is the statement that one boy is said to have made.

Such a remark is worthy of a Chicago gangster or a New York gunman. A remark like that leads us to believe that the rod has been spared too much in the home and that the rebellious spirit is a repetition of a spirit shown at home before which parents have given way.

If such is the case, the parents are as much to blame as the pupil. One thing, however, is certain and that is that the Eugene school board, the superintendent and the principal must win their fight, and the boys responsible for the rebellion must be adequately punished or we may as well prepare to do

away with our schools. We are not willing to pay our good tax money to raise anarchists.

The condition that these student rebels have created is such that it is no longer a question of whether Principal Swan is right or wrong. It is now a question largely of whether students will be obedient to the authorities or whether the authorities shall bow to students who may think that they are demonstrating the independence and initiative of youth of a new age.

The rebellion must be firmly put down. After that the questions under dispute may be taken up in an orderly way, but a stable government does not treat with rebels. If it did it would not long remain a stable government.

More than that, we owe it to these boys, to ourselves and to future generations to take out of these boys the anarchistic ideas which if permitted to flourish might develop into a cancer that would poison and wreck a nation.
