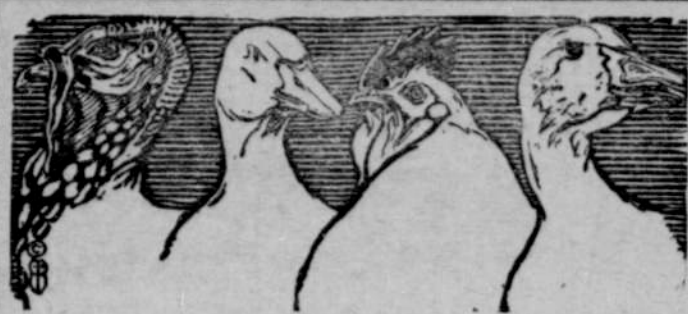

ENTIRE TUG CREW LOST IN EXPLOSION AT SEA

(By United Press.)
Anacortes, Wash., Nov. 22.—(Special.)—Nine lives was the toll yesterday in a tragedy when the steam tug Bahada was wrecked at sea by a boiler explosion. The entire crew, including Captain George Hansen, was lost. All but one or two of the men were trapped in their bunks. The tug, with a raft tow, had left Anacortes bound for Bellingham and was well out to sea when the explosion occurred. The tragedy was not learned until the raft floated ashore with the sunken tug dragging at the tow line in 42 fathoms of water.

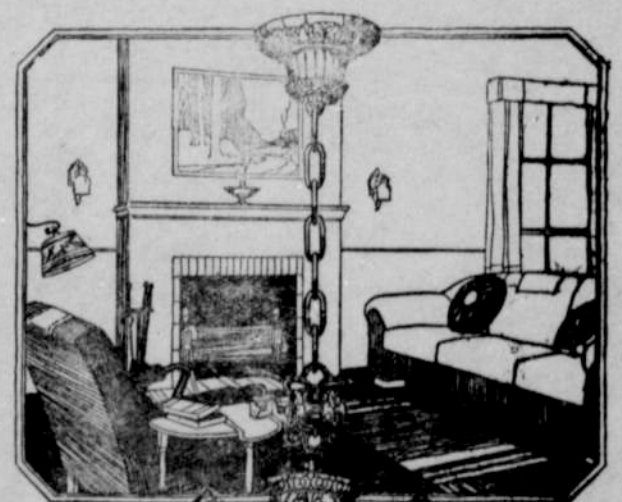
