HOLDING BACK DESERVING.

Affairs like the recent one in which students have practically defied school authorities are likely to bring upon education criticism which education does not deserve.

To those a short distance removed from the scene, the fault seems to be as much with parents as with students and school authorities. The offending school principal may or may not be the right man for the job. That is not the issue, but it appears to this writer that parents have sympathized with children who have criticized their principal and that this sympathetic attitude of parents towards insubordination of pupils has brought about a condition that is going to test the mettle of school authorities of the university city.

The situation at Eugene makes it more apparent than ever that the schools must more and more take the place of parents. If such is the expectation of parents, then it is up to the schools to make education a reward for correct conduct and an earnest desire to secure that education.

Every pupil who measures up to such requirements should be given every reasonable opportunity to obtain an education, but school should not be a place to which children are sent merely to keep them out of mischief a few hours each day—school should not be a place largely or exclusively for play and entertainment.

It would be a splendid idea, if it could be worked out, to take the tax money that is wasted upon those who have no definite idea of why they are going to school, or those who have a definite idea that they are going there for other things than making the most of the opportunities offered them, and place it in a fund available for those earnest students who are financially handicapped. There are too many who spend four to eight years twiddling their fingers and too many who would do something with education who are unable, because of financial circumstances, to get the education that they would put to good use. A method of equalization would be well worth while and might bring about some startling results in the accomplishments of education.

We realize that this is a highly theoretical proposal and mention it largely to emphasize the fact that unappreciative ones are keeping from appreciative ones that to which the latter are entitled.

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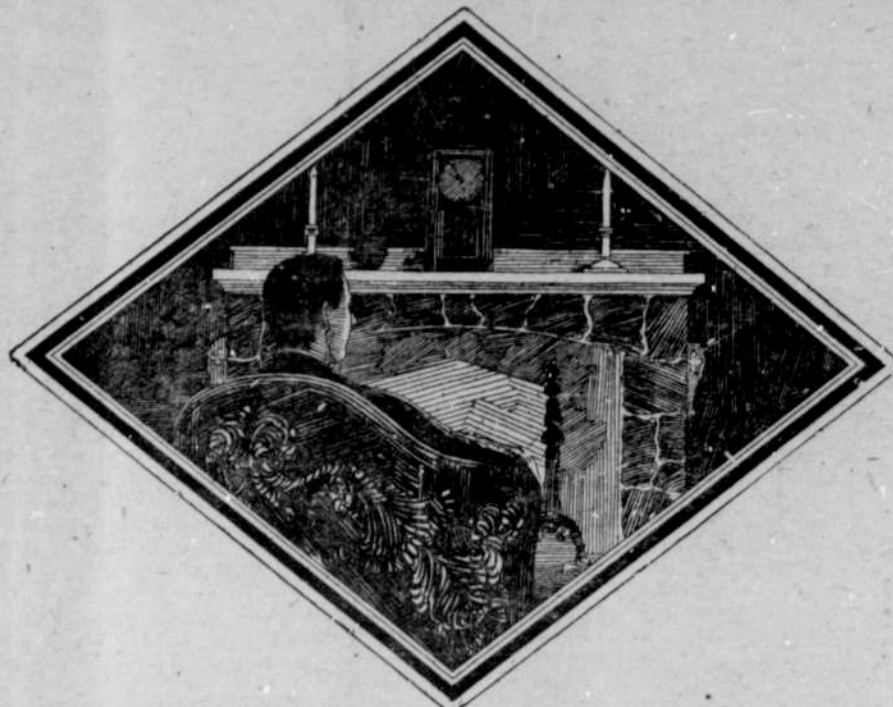
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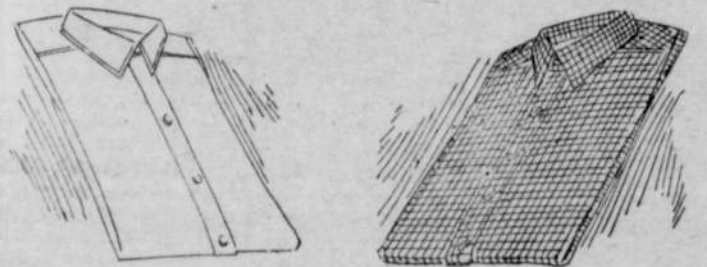
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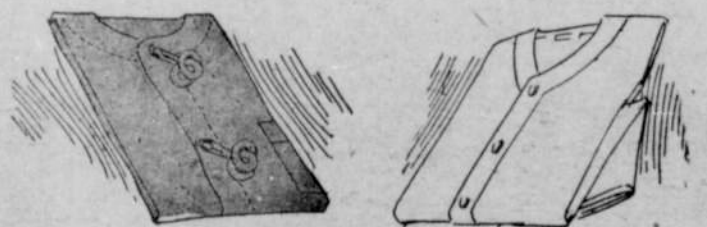
