Ford Mileage Test To Be Held Dec. 18

Mileage that improved 1926 model Ford cars can get from one gallon of gasoline will be ascertained Saturday, December 18, when owners of such models will compete for prizes totaling \$250. The test will be held under the auspices of six Ford dealers in Lane county.

The cars must have only standard equipment and only standard gasoline, such as is available at any service station, will be allowed them. A representative of the state department of weights and measures will be on hand at the starting point, the Woodson garage at Cottage Grove, to see that but one gallon is put in an empty tank. The drivers will start at 10 o'clock in the morning and will drive until the gasoline runs out. They will be accompanied by a board of judges in a Lincoln car with a registered speedometer. Judges are Judge G. F. Skipworth, Elbert Bede, William Bell, J. O. Holt and Edward F. Bailey.

When the gas runs out, the judges will check the mileage. Service cars in the caravan will supply gasoline so that the cars can be driven back to their respective towns. Flagmen will guard railroad crossings and state traffic men will accompany the drivers.
