CAMERON TAKES ISSUE UNEDUCATED MINISTRY

"Amos, the Preacher Who Had No College Education" was the subject of Pastor Duncan P. Cameron at the Wednesday night prayer meeting of the Presbyterian church. Pastor Cameron took issue with the statement made recently by Nicholas Murry Butler, president of Columbia university, to the board of trustees that the fundamental trouble with the world is an uneducated ministry. Cameron showed what had been accomplished in the past by ministers who had had no higher education and said that Butler might have mentioned irreligious education as a fundamental cause of trouble.

Pastor Cameron voiced the opinion that no one should be permitted to teach who has not experienced some religious feeling in his life. He emphasized the value of education yet hoped that no one would be despised for want of an education. A spirited discussion on the points brought out in the talk was held by those attending. The subject on which Pastor Cameron will speak at the next meeting is, "Hoses, the Man Whose Heart Was Broken."

McKenzie Trapper Gets Legacy \$10,000

Ten thousand dollars and a hunting lodge in the Cascades is the legacy received by George H. Moody, trapper and guide of McKenzie Bridge, from Herman O. Vogel, millionaire of Los Angeles, who died at Innsbruck, Austria, last month, and whose will was filed for probate at Los Angeles Saturday, disposing of an estate of \$2,500,000.

For the past several years Mr. Vogel has been an autumn visitor in the Cascades on hunting trips and Mr. Moody has been his packer and guide. In 1918 Mr. Vogel built a hunting cabin on Elk lake and Mr. Moody had the contract for this building, this being the beginning of his association with the Los Angeles millionaire.

A permit for a dwelling and store on south Sixth street has been issued in December to J. B. Argabright.

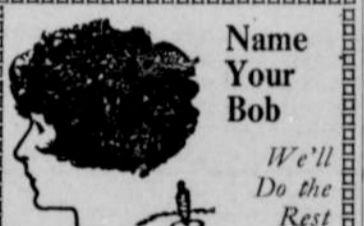
Report on County Farm Submitted.
