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PRESBYTERIANS HOLD THEIR CHRISTMAS TREE

A Christmas program and a tree for the children were held at the Sunday evening service of the Presbyterian church. The program was presented largely by the primary department of the Sunday school and a treat of oranges and sacks of candy was given each child. Santa Claus presided over distribution of gifts and all children of the primary department made his acquaintance and told of their wishes for Christmas. About 450 attended. The church was beautifully decorated with evergreen streamers, red Christmas bells, holly wreaths and two trimmed Christmas trees.

At the forenoon Christmas service Pastor Cameron spoke on "Behold the Man," dealing with the human side of Christ's life. The choir sang as special numbers, "Send Out Thy Light," "Hark, Hark, My Soul," "Holy Redeemer" and "O Holy Night."

The basketball team of the Lion Pioneers won its first Pioneer league game Saturday afternoon when it defeated the Eagle quintet of Eugene 19 to 11 in a keenly contested, hard fought game. Twice the Eagles lead the local team but each time the Lions came back strong. At half time the Lions led 7 to 4 but immediately after the start of the second half the Eagles ran their score to 11, holding the Lions scoreless. Close checking and accurate basket shooting saved the game for the locals.

The fire had resulted in disconnecting the lights in the house and the firemen had to fight in the dark.
