TALKING "TO" AND "WITH" CHILDREN.

(Portland Spectator.)

A kind friend asks The Spectator to note the growth of bad manners and the increase of immorality and criminality among children, and "to please talk to the young people about it." No, thank you. If what the kind friend says is true of the manners and morals of our children, I am inclined to think that some of the delinquency is due to our bad persistency in talking too much "to" and not enough "with" our young folks. Even grown-ups resent being talked "to," and if they are any wiser or gentler or better than children, criminal statistics and the records of our prisons and penitentiaries fail to furnish proof of this superiority.

Our habit of talking "to" children has been perseveringly pursued for a long time; if we are to accept the word of our good friend, it either has made no dent on their impressionable minds, or they have preferred to follow our bad example rather than our good preachment. From the standpoint of The Spectator which, on this and all other matters, is merely an innocent though interested observer, it seems as if we might well abandon our unsuccessful practice of talking "to" the youngsters, and begin doing a little—not too much talking "with" them. This change might result in a pleasant revival of the charming art of conversation, which, some of The Spectator's small acquaintances declare, is between parents and children confined almost wholly to the monosyllabism of "Don't" and "Why?" In some happy home, the inequality that marks the gatherings of parenthood and offspring would be considered the refinement of reticence on the golf links.

Despite what is said about and against the youngsters of today, The Spectator doubts that they are much, if they are any, worse than were those of yesterday, or the day before. Indeed, an interesting writer in the Atlantic Monthly prints for our consideration and instruction the following, which rather corroborates our opinion:

"The moral desolation and flood-tide of wickedness threaten to sweep away not only the blessings of religion, but the boasted freedom of our republican institutions as well. And what of our youth? Today, where one child hails the Sabbath with delight as the day for Bible study, one hundred young immortals are growing up in ignorance and sin. The lamentable extent of dishonesty, fraud and other wickedness among our boys and girls shocks the nation. Of 256 convicts in the Massachusetts state's prison, 45 were thieves at 16 years of age and 127 had at that age become habitual drinkers. And even among more refined surroundings our young people are everything but serious minded today. Persons with the smallest of incomes do not stick to have two or three pairs of silk stockings. Time was when one could have clothed herself from head to toe for what one pair of these silk stockings costs."

Sounds as familiar as the ticking of the old clock. And yet the old clock has ticked off a deal of time since that picture, including the silk stockings, was painted of the condition of the youth of the country; the story appeared in one of the periodicals in the year 1830. The grandfathers of today should be able to tell us of the oburgations and warnings—the talkings "to"—they had in their youth tended to an amendment of their manners and morals.

Contrary to the statement of The Spectator's correspondent, it is not a fact that our children are growing worse; the assertion, however, has been penned and tongued so often, that many persons will continue to believe it in preference to the facts given out by the United States Children's Bureau. Secretary of Labor Davis tells us:

"Reliable figures as to commitments to institutions, based on census reports covering the entire country, indicate a decline in the number of delinquent children committed to institutions, if growth in population be taken into consideration, and reveal no significant increase in the number committed for the more serious offenses—homicide, robbery, and burglary. According to the census reports, the age of commitment to penal institutions has not decreased, as has frequently been asserted."

And there you are. And if you stop and think of the example set to our children; of the stories of crime, accompanied so frequently by sob-sister excuses for the criminals, that are placed before them; of the heroic figures that the big criminals are made into; and of the lessons they receive in high-class robbery and jeggery, you may well wonder not at the immorality and vice that are charged against our youth, but at the fineness and splendor of their boyhood and girlhood.
