In its editorial columns the newspaper shows itself as the great friend of the better interests of the community, of the things for which religion stands. A large proportion of all editorials are those that uplift, point a moral or urge readers to better, nobler and higher things. The churches would be much weakened were this aid taken from them.

A newspaper is decidedly a handmaiden of religion and of the churches and of all organizations that stand for law, order, cleanliness and an observance of the rules laid down in that great book which should be the rule and guide of our faith.

Member of National Editorial Association Oregon State Editorial Association Oregon Newspaper Conference. NEWSPAPERS AND RELIGION. Possibly about the last thing a large part of the public thinks of a newspaper as having is religion. The "devil" is more or less of a necessity around a printshop and things that newspapers have said have raised more hell and have caused more breaking of the commandment, "Thou shalt not take the name of the Lord, thy God, in vain," than all the other forces of the earth.

Yet despite these things, a newspaper usually is religion's best friend and a great force working for the same things for which religion is working.

A newspaper, it often is said, and with considerable truth, preaches to thousands where the preacher preaches to hundreds. Newspapers are helping to bring about familiarity with the bible by publishing daily and weekly bible lessons and by the regular use of bible quotations. Strange as it may seem to some, many editors show familiarity with biblical teachings in their liberal quotations from the great and good book in their editorial discussions.

Without newspaper publicity, religion would not have made the great forward steps for which it is given credit.

A newspaper which assumes the place that it should in its community will be found standing for those things that are thought to be for the progress and betterment of the community, for the things that will make the community a better place in which to live; that will do things, in fact, which have the spoken support of every church organization.

Newspapers usually are ready to denounce sham and hypocrisy. Not religious institutions, not religiously minded, but usually can lead along a course between the extremes of the narrow minded on the one hand, and the wide eyed on the other.

Who would have all of us adopt the form of worship and their belief as to the way in which our actions should be regulated, between these and the extremists on the other side who believe that it is no one else's business what they do.

The Sentinel doesn't believe in forcing any belief on any one, but it does believe that this community, and any other community, would be in a better way were religion taken from it, were there no churches, no preachers, no religion. If churches, preachers and religion are necessary to our well being, then it is the duty of a newspaper to cooperate with these interests which never advocate or support anything which would have a tendency to drag a community down morally.
