Seventy-Six Killed In Montreal Stampede

MONTREAL, Jan. 10.—(United Press.)—All through the night mothers and fathers moved in little groups through the city morgue seeking their children among the bodies taken from the Laurier Palace picture theater, where 76 were suffocated and trampled to death in the mad stampede caused by a small fire in the balcony. In the hospitals 30 or more lie injured. Seventy-four of the dead have been identified.

About 1000 were in the theater Sunday and most of the audience in the balcony were children because the admission price there was cheaper. Most of those on the lower floor escaped but those higher up were caught in a jam. A minor fire, tragically entitled "Get 'Em Young," was flickering on the screen when the stampede broke.

The bodies were so tightly wedged that firemen could not gain entrance. It was necessary to cut a hole through a street wall before the mass could be unwedged.

The whole town worked to extricate the mass. When the dead and injured had been removed firemen turned attention to flames which were quickly extinguished. Had there been no stampede it is possible that few would have been hurt.

Protestantism Always In Van Says Cameron

Americanism and Protestantism Must Survive Together; Contributions Told.

That the Americanism we boast of and the Protestantism we love must survive or perish together was the declaration of Pastor Duncan P. Cameron Sunday evening, speaking to a capacity audience on the subject of "The Romance of Protestantism" at the Presbyterian church.

That Protestantism was not simply an event in the marching of the nations was emphasized by the speaker. "For a period of 400 years Protestantism has stood foursquare to the world always in the van, battling for righteousness and freedom of conscience," the speaker said. "Protestantism is a spirit as quiet as the sunlight, as pervasive as the air and as far reaching as the needs of man."

That Protestantism had made at least nine distinct contributions to the welfare of the world was the statement of the speaker. These are: (1) Protestantism has emphasized the value of the individual in church and state; (2) Protestantism has enthroned reason on the earth and taught men how to think; (3) Protestantism has given birth to modern science and shown us the value of a fact; (4) Protestantism has created a new university for humanity namely the public school; (5) Protestantism has placed a newspaper in the hands of every man, in this connection Pastor Cameron paid a high tribute to the power of the press and its far reaching and exciting influence on our life; (6) the Spirit of Protestantism strikes an unerring blow at all forms of superstition; (7) Protestantism has enthroned the spirit of toleration in the very broadest sense; (8) Protestantism has created a spirit which is one of genuine equality; (9) Protestantism has taken religion out of the monasteries and nunneries and given it to a needy world.

Pastor Cameron in closing made a strong plea for support of our public schools and for the week day religious education movement which he said was the greatest movement of modern times in an educational way.

The policies of the administration in regard to Nicaragua had drawn fire from congress which demanded a show down. President Coolidge's message was in reply to congress' demand for information.

The administration reached the decision today that the marines in the South American country are to stay for a long time at least.

Several companies of marines are being put on a war time footing at the base at San Diego in preparation for a possible expedition to Nicaragua.

International Accord Fostered by Highways

NEW YORK, Jan. 10.—(United Press.)—Importance of highways as factors in the promotion of international good will was pointed out today at the opening of the third annual World Motor Transport Congress here by Charles Clifton, president of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, in his welcoming address.

Delegates were in attendance from 50 countries at the opening session.

Highways are one of the most effective means of communication, the basis of mutual understanding, President Clifton said.

J. W. Drake, assistant secretary of commerce, Cyrus McCormack Jr., vice president of the International Harvester Co., and Edward G. Wilmer, president of Dodge Brothers, were other speakers on the opening program. John N. Willys, chairman of the foreign trade committee of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, and president of the Willys Overland, presided.

Automobile club members, manufacturers, traders and government officials were represented at the meeting, the chief purpose of which is to promote transportation throughout the world.

Motor transport will be particularly helpful to undeveloped countries, Edward W. Wilmer indicated in his talk. There are vast resources of the earth in lumber, minerals and other products, which are at present unavailable because of lack of facilities for moving them, he said.
