NORTHERN CALIFORNIA HAS BIG SUPPLY WINE SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10.—(United Press).—More wine is produced in northern California than in all the rest of the United States, according to a report of the internal revenue bureau announced here. With a production for the entire country of 5,832,552 gallons of dry and 8543 gallons of sweet wine for the year ending July 1, northern California produced far and away the most with 4,373,914 gallons of dry and 2,100 of sweet wines. The dry wines contain less than fourteen per cent alcohol while the sweet contain from 14 to 21 per cent. There are 254,816 quarts, 114,389 pints and 86 magnums of champagne and sparkling wines now on hand in Northern California, the report says, in addition to 11,868,159 gallons of dry and 5,876,475 gallons of sweet wine.

Coolidge's Ancestry Is Being Traced

NEWTON, Mass., Jan. 10.—(United Press).—President Coolidge's ancestry is being traced by one of his distant cousins here. The genealogist is Miss Emma D. Coolidge, who believes that the Coolidge family tree does not reflect all the glory that is due the chief executive's forefathers. Miss Coolidge thinks the president is a descendant of Nathaniel rather than Simon Coolidge. Both were prominent citizens of Watertown, near here, but Nathaniel was far more active in the political affairs of the early colony. In an effort to obtain more comprehensive data regarding the president's family tree, Miss Coolidge, who is secretary of the Coolidge Family association, has broadcast letters to some 4,000 persons who bear her name.

Arcade Theatre to Show Famous Valentino Film

Rex Ingram's well remembered screen classic, "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse," one of the greatest films ever produced by the industry, has returned in triumph in response to a flood of requests from exhibitors all over the country. It will be shown Tuesday* and Wednesday, at the Arcade theater.

This picture, unsurpassed as an artistic record of its time, is the film that brought the late Rudolph Valentino to fame. Valentino plays opposite Alice Terry in this picture, and in it does some of the best work he ever contributed to the screen.

While every play of the twenty-five principal roles was selected because of his or her special ability to enact the part, there is scarcely a name in the list that is not prominently known to motion picture followers.

An enormous cast was employed by Director Ingram with phenomenal success in translating the popular Mexican novel to the screen.

The setting up of new records for motion picture producers of the future to equal or surpass has come about through the very bigness of the story of "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse." Its characters work out their destinies on two hemispheres. From the Argentine, with its far-flung ranges, to the capitals of Europe, the characters in this master work of fiction are faithfully portrayed on the screen as the story works out its tense human drama against the background of a world in arms.

A total of 12,500 men and women, or the adult population of a city of 60,000, participated in the filming of the picture, either before the camera or as workers on the big sets. The cast interpreting the roles in the most widely read book of all time, excepting the Bible, contains two dozen principals, who in other productions would be rated as stars.

For his excellent work as director of "The Four Horsemen of the Apocalypse," Rex Ingram received the degree of bachelor of fine arts from Yale. He is the first man to be honored by a great university for movie work.

COUNTY CLUB LEADER SPEAKER AT LATHAM

A meeting, sponsored by the Latham Community club, was held Friday night at the Latham school house. The program was under the direction of Mrs. Hugh Truanel, Arnold D. Collier, assistant county school superintendent and director of the boys and girls club work, spoke on the county club work and gave an outline covering the activities of the clubs. Pastor D. P. Cameron gave a talk on "Moral and Spiritual Education." In the absence of Miss Beth Konkel, secretary of the Lane county public health association, who was to have spoken on physical and health education, Pastor Cameron included this topic in his address. An orchestra from the Presbyterian church of Cottage Grove, under the direction of J. W. Craig, furnished music during the evening. A social time followed and light refreshments were served. More than fifty attended the meeting.

DIVORCE CASUALTIES HEAVY DURING 1926

The number of divorces granted in Lane county during 1926 was unusually heavy, according to a report compiled recently by the county clerk's office. Divorces granted equaled nearly 39 per cent of the number of marriage licenses issued.

As has always been the case in Lane county, wives were the most frequent plaintiffs, the number far exceeding that of the husbands who sued.

The circuit court records show that 179 divorces were granted. Marriage licenses issued during the year totaled 465.

Alien Examination Feb. 11.

An examination of aliens, who are applying for American citizenship, will be held February 11 in the circuit court at Eugene before Judge G. F. Skipworth. An examiner from the immigration bureau headquarters of Portland will conduct the examination. It is necessary to file applications 90 days before the examination date. Sixteen aliens will take the examination. Alex Lundberg of Disston, native of Denmark, is one of the applicants.

Air Mail Change Saves Time.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10.—(United Press).—A saving of seven hours in the air mail schedule from San Francisco to Seattle was effected by abandoning the landing field at Concord in favor of Crissey field here.

The Pacific Air Transport company, which has the Los Angeles to Seattle contract, said a letter mailed at the Ferry postoffice here would leave at 5:30 a. m. now for Crissey field, whereas before the closing time for Seattle mail was 10 o'clock the previous night.

AMERICAN COOPERATION PRAISED BY JAPANESE

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 10.—(United Press).—Dr. Mikinowake Miyajima, member of the Japanese diet and a professor at Keo university, Tokyo, on a tour of inspection of universities, biological laboratories and health departments in this country at the invitation of the Rockefeller foundation, stated after visiting the University of California and Stanford that he was particularly impressed with the spirit of cooperation he finds in American institutions.

"Cooperation seems to be an outstanding characteristic of your country," Dr. Miyajima said. "It is responsible for the wonderful progress education has made in the United States during the past decade. This is the big lesson I shall take back to Japan."

"I have noticed that much emphasis is placed upon sports in American universities," the professor continued. "That is no doubt one big reason for the co-operation that is apparent in all college activities. Interest in sports is rapidly increasing in Japan. Baseball is the most popular American sport in Japan. Football is just getting a start. Some day we may have the game mastered well enough to bring about some great international gridiron contests."
