COUNTIES WILL RAISE FUND TO FIGHT STATE

A fund of \$1500 will be raised by the 18 counties of the state, which hope to benefit by the Oregon-California land tax refund, to be used in combating the state in the issue. Guy Cordon, district attorney of Douglas county, has been retained as legal adviser for the interested counties. Lane county's share of the fund to be raised is \$208.86, as the land grant acreage is 13.91 per cent of the total for Lane.

In a recent decision by Attorney General I. H. VanWinkle handed to District Attorney John H. Carson, he holds that the state is entitled to a share of the refund equal to the taxes which would have been assessed against the lands after they were taken over by the government. The matter will be referred to Congressman W. C. Hawley for further opinion. Mr. Hawley, with the county judges and commissioners of the state, has been working on the theory that the entire refund should go to the state.

Otters Destroy Fish.

PARIS, Jan. 17.—(United Press.)—More than 60,000,000 francs worth of fish are destroyed each year by otters in the rivers and ponds of France. This has resulted in the general committee of the French Fishing club sounding a note of alarm and declaring 'war' on this valuable fur-coated 'swimming dog.'

Sixty-nine Mills Listed in Lane.

There are 69 'live' lumber and shingle mills in Lane county in operation now, according to a list prepared by the United States forest department. A report on this has been received from the forestry department with the request that if there are any more mills not included on the department report that they be added.

Lane Harbor Fund Allotted.

The annual war department appropriation bill reported to the house of representatives last week includes an allotment of \$49,000 for proposed improvements of the Siuslaw river and harbor. The appropriation of two years ago was used in removing two shoals near the mouth of the North Fork and the sum provided this year will probably be used for dredging the river below Florence. The total appropriation for the river and harbor development for the state of Oregon is \$648,000. Of this amount, \$83,000 is for improvement and \$565,000 for maintenance. The entire appropriation provided by this bill is \$50,000,000.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 17.—(United Press.)—Running the United States Government since 1791 has cost approximately \$120,000,000,000, according to statistics made public by the treasury department.

More than half of this vast sum was spent during and after the World War. From 1917 to the end of 1926, the actual government expenses were \$82,000,000,000.

President Coolidge has asked Congress to appropriate \$4,000,000,000 to operate the nation during the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1927, thus increasing the total amount to nearly \$125,000,000,000.

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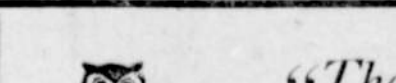
