EMPLOYMENT AIDED BY LOGGING RESUMPTION

PORTLAND, Jan. 20.—(Special.)—Employment in the Pacific northwest has been aided somewhat during the past week when logging was resumed at many camps in the fir districts from southern Oregon to the Canadian line, according to the 4L employment office here. Approximately 3200 loggers have returned to work since Jan. 10, the 4L reported.

Lumber manufacturing in the fir districts, however, continues to operate under a slow bell. Seventeen night shifts that were in operation before the holiday shutdown have not resumed work and there are no less than twenty medium and large size mills that are still down while repairs and overhauling are being done. Many plants are cutting but four and five days per week. More than 15,000 men are affected by shutdowns and short weeks.

SALARY INCREASE BILL SURVIVES VOTE HOUSE

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore., Jan. 17.—The first vetoed bill of the present session to be given the chance to see whether it could survive a roll call is one that might be expected to prove unpopular, but which nevertheless secured more than the necessary two-thirds in the house. It was one to increase salaries of state officers and garnered 46 votes. All Lane house members voted in the affirmative. By the terms of the bill, vetoed H. R. 259, the salary of governor is increased to \$7500, that of secretary of state to \$5400, that of state treasurer to \$5400 and that of attorney general to \$5000.

These may seem like large salaries to those living far from the seat of government and compelled to rear families on a small part of any one of these salaries, but the difference would be found to be greater if the amount on which the small fellow has to rear a family should be compared with what men of the ability of our present state officers are getting in private business. No one receives so small an income but what he willingly contributes his two-bit pieces to help pay fabulous salaries to movie actors and actresses who would make a fizzle of conducting public office.
