Oranges Survive Freezing.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 24.—(United Press.)—Oranges can remain in a temperature nine points below freezing for several hours without getting frost-bitten, according to a series of experiments just completed here.

A number of oranges were placed in a cold storage temperature of 23 degrees. An orange was removed every hour and it was not until the sixth hour that any trace of ice was discernible.

Authorities are unable to decide whether the case is that of suicide or murder.

COLUMBIA RIVER HOLDS IDENTITY OF TWO MEN

(Special to The Sentinel.) THE DALLES, Jan. 24.—(United Press.)—The Columbia river today holds the winter's greatest mystery—the identity of a man or two men who are believed to have crashed through the ice near Rowena late yesterday, sinking after clinging desperately to the edge of the ice floe for hours.

Information obtained from Lyle, Wash., indicated that the men were seen to start from the Oregon shore about 3 o'clock and pick their way over the tumbled ice floe as if to cross the river. They were not seen to reach the Washington shore.

Later what appeared to be the heads of two men were seen just above the floe through field glasses by watchers. The objects were still there at dark but searchers were unable to find the men as darkness and the broken character of the ice prevented the rescue party from venturing away from shore.

Eskimos Reform, Bishop Says. SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—(United Press.)—No longer does the Eskimo trade his wife away for a whaling spear, sled dog, can of tobacco, salt or a bottle of rum.

Their pagan morals are purified; they have turned Christian, those sturdy men of the snowlands, according to Pastor Peter Rowe, Episcopal bishop of Alaska, founder of the Episcopal Mission, who is here for a brief vacation.

"The Eskimo doesn't swap squaws with his friend anymore," the bishop said. "They have abandoned witchcraft and lost faith in the medicine man, too."

MUSICAL NOTES NOW MEASURED IN POUNDS

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 24.—(United Press.)—The harmonious flow of musical notes can now be estimated in pounds and tons, with a far greater output for the nation than any mineral or product in the world.

In a recent test, Miss Virginia Cox, San Francisco pianist, demonstrated that a piano player of average "touch," strikes 300 chords a minute with an average pressure of five pounds to each chord.

It takes four minutes to play Chopin's "Valse in C Sharp." That makes 1200 chords, or a total of 6000 pounds, or three tons of music in three minutes. An ordinary pair of butter and egg weighing scales placed on the piano was used to test the volume of playing.

Miss Cox is a small person, physically, yet she produces more volume of music than a hard rock miner or convict in turning out minerals or in breaking rocks.

MACHINERY ARRIVES FOR O. A. C. COURSE

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Jan. 24.—The first of eight new machines to be used at the sixth annual canner's school which is arranged by the horticultural products section has been received by the college.

This machine is a number 400 Canco, a high speed, four roll, four head double seamer which has a capacity of 160 cans a minute. It weighs about 6000 pounds and is valued at \$4000. The total valuation of the machines that are being sent by the American Can company for use in the short course is nearly \$20,000.

H. E. Bausman and Harry Holcomb of the American Can company will give a course in double seaming machines. The course will cover care, adjustment, and operation of Canco "O" and Canco "OO" machines as well as the fourhead Canco 400.
