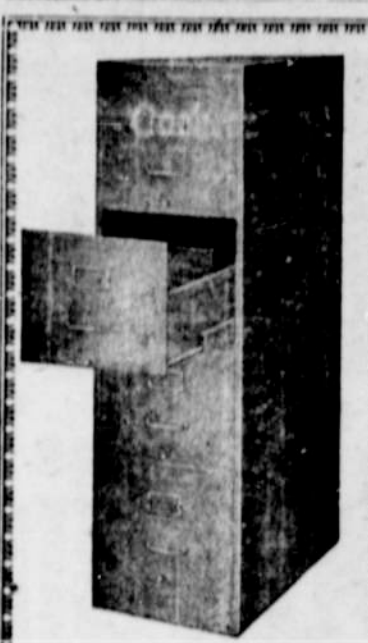
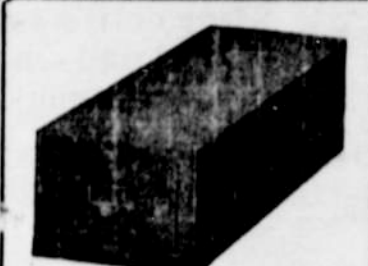

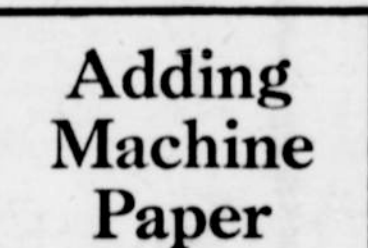

Fraud Practiced on Devotees of Buddha

Original Glee Club

The glee club, which originated in some meetings at the house of Mr. Robert Smith in St. Paul's churchyard (England), commenced in 1783, at which motets, madrigals, glees, canons and catches were sung after dinner. The meetings were subsequently held at Doctor Beevers' and other houses until, in 1787, it was resolved to establish a society to be called the Glee Club, the first public meeting of which took place at the Newcastle coffee house on Saturday, December 22, 1787.

First Motor Cycle

The earliest known attempt at a two-wheeled vehicle which would proceed under its own power is said to have been made by W. W. Austin of Winthrop, Mass., in 1885. It was propelled by a coal-burning steam engine. Other more or less similar affairs followed in 1884 and 1886. In 1885 a cycle propelled by a combustion engine using gasoline was exhibited at Madison Square garden in New York city. This has been called the first appearance of the motor cycle in the form in which it is known today.

Filed on the great arid Black Rock Desert, the story unfolds a world of entertaining and educational features.

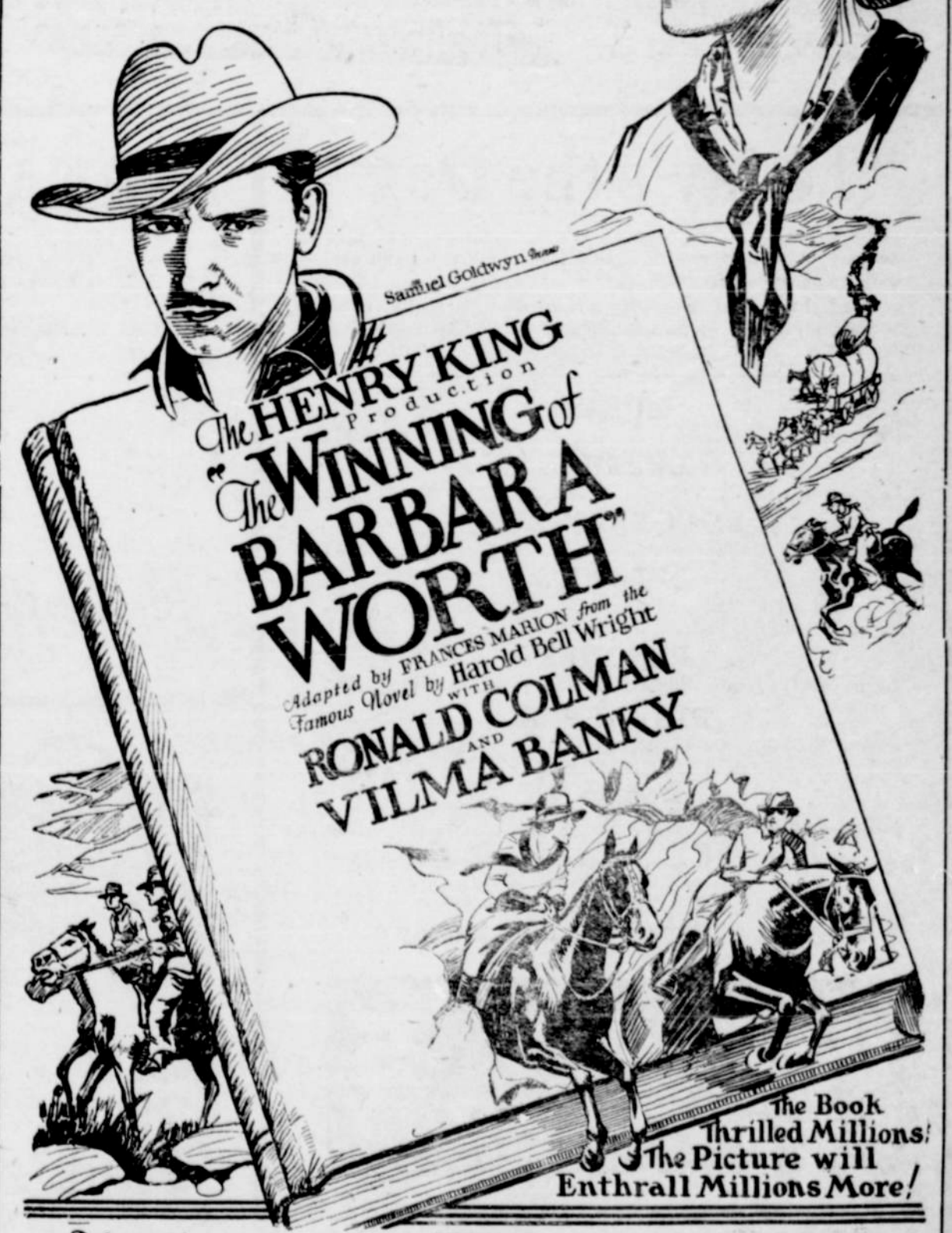
