CITY COUNCIL VOTES ON HALL FURNISHINGS

The city council met Saturday night in an adjourned session. The city attorney was instructed to prepare an ordinance governing the acceptance by the city of the Angola addition. It consists of approximately six blocks owned by George Hawley and is a continuation of Main, Ash and Birch streets west of town and extending toward the cemetery. Mr. Hawley recently had the land platted.

Furnishing of the new city hall was discussed and \$650 was taken from the general fund to purchase linoleum for floor coverings for one hall, one stairway and the recorder's office. A 4-foot sidewalk will be laid north of the building with walks connecting it to the two side entrances. It will be separated from the alley by posts and chains. The piece of ground between the building and the front walk will be seeded to grass.

Assessment Plans Under Way.

Preparation of the field sheets to be used by the deputy county assessors in their assessment work to start March 1 is under way at the office of Ben F. Keeney, county assessor. Bills are now before the state legislature providing for changes in the assessment system, one provision being that the assessment should be taken January 1 rather than March 1. This legislation will not apply this year unless there is an emergency clause and this is not likely, in the opinion of Mr. Keeney.

London Mansion Long Abode of Noted Men

London's most famous gathering place for the aristocracy is Albany house, where Gladstone, Disraeli, Henry Irving, Byron, Canning and other notable figures have lived. Albany was purchased from the spendthrift duke of York during the reign of George III by Alexander Copland, a London builder, who had conceived the idea of turning the duke's Piccadilly mansion into an apartment building of 42 suites. The freeholders of the building, all of whom have always been men, number 50.

Under the rules the suites are occupied almost entirely by bachelors or widowers and none may carry on a business or profession within its walls. It is operated by men of social and political prestige along business lines without idea of profit and the trustees have turned down offers of millions for the site.—New York Times.

Educational Museum

Agricultural museums are found in Switzerland, Germany, Denmark and Holland. The collections consist not only of minerals, insects, agricultural products and by-products, but also contain models of farm animals, models and specifications of agricultural implements, illustrations showing the advance of insect pests, and the manner in which they attack. These collections are usually in connection with some agricultural school and are used for purposes of illustration and demonstration. One of the largest of these museums is located at Berlin in Germany.

The Hole in Macaroni

A visitor's query: "What makes the hole in macaroni?" was answered the other day by a macaroni and spaghetti factory. A bronze pin does it. Bronze is used for many reasons, but principally because it is clean and will not rust. Numerous little bronze pins are located within the perforations of the macaroni die. Dough is forced through the top of the die by hydraulic pressure, and as it comes through the bottom it takes on the well-known form of macaroni. A similar bronze die forms spaghetti, a smaller bronze pin being used.—New York Times.

UNITED STATES SHOWS INCREASE POPULATION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 31.—(United Press.)—The total population of the United States for July 1, 1927, is estimated by the census bureau today at 118,628,000. The official population figure from the last census was 105,710,629, and it is presumed that the country's population has increased 12,917,380 in 7½ years.

Oregon's population on July 1, 1927, is estimated at 810,000 as compared with 783,389 on January 1, 1920. Figures show that Oregon's population has shown a steady increase during the last 7½ years.
