The first general session will take place tomorrow morning when President Herbert J. Tily of Philadelphia will make his address on the keynote of the convention. Lew Hahn, managing director of the organization, will also be on the opening program. There will be a number of specialized group sessions in various phases of merchandising. The convention closes Friday.

PROGRAM WORK CURES SOLDIERS IN HOSPITAL

MADISON, Wis., Feb. 7.—(United Press.)—Most of the patients of the Soldiers Memorial hospital at Soldiers Point near Madison who are cured, go home because a carefully planned course of work sets their minds on the trail to normality.

Furniture, jewelry, rugs, baskets and table runners are a few of the things made by the patients, all of which are sold for the cost of making them. They also take care of the hospital grounds and run a small truck garden.

The institution discharges about 15 men a month, as cured. A large percentage of these patients return later, however, for while they can make the necessary social adjustments, they cannot adjust themselves to the different economic standards.

ADMINISTRATION WAITS WAR LORDS' ANSWERS

WASHINGTON, D. C. Feb. 7.—(United Press.)—With the safety of five thousand American citizens at stake in China the administration of the nation today is grimly awaiting answers from Chinese war lords to the proposal from this country to neutralize Shanghai with its international settlement.

If the proposal is rejected President Coolidge is determined to use the fleet and marines to protect American lives and property.

A detachment of marines was moved from Guam to Manila and sent into concentration camp recently to await further developments in China.

Dr. Henderson urged that people be not as sheep and follow the vain parade of the modern world but be as godly men and women following the word of the Gospel.
