UNIVERSITY FACULTY WRITINGS PUBLISHED

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, Feb. 10.—(Special)—Productive scholarly activity of the university faculty during the past year has been notable according to a report just issued by the library

on the writings of professors. Books and articles, both technical and popular, for last year total 83, the report stated.

Thirty-five members of the faculty in the schools of journalism, business administration, education, and the departments of political science, romance language,

psychology, English, geology, mathematics, zoology, chemistry, botany and the extension division have submitted writings to various publications throughout the country.

A bibliography of the writings of new members of the faculty previous to 1926 includes 113 articles and books. Works by Clarence V. Boyer, Dr. Arnold Bennett Hall, Dr. A. R. Moore, head of the zoology department; H. G. Townsend, professor of philosophy; Harold S. Tuttle, assistant professor of education, and Horace G. Wynt, assistant professor of psychology, were recorded in this classification.

Lane Salary Measure Faces Governor's Veto

Malheur Treasurer's Raise Defeat Indicates Executive's Stand.

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore., Feb. 9.—Lane county officers would better prepare to serve out their present terms at their present salaries unless there are sufficient votes in the two houses to pass local salary rise bills over the gubernatorial veto. This is indicated by the fact that Governor Patterson has vetoed the bill that would give a slight boost to the treasurer of Malheur county. This veto is taken to indicate that all similar bills will receive similar treatment. The reason for the veto is that the chief executive believes that incumbents should serve out their terms at the salaries in effect at the time they were elected. He probably will affix his signature to bills carrying a provision in accordance with this idea.

Of course overriding the veto is not at all impossible. In fact it can be easily done if the salary rise bills can get the same number of votes for that purpose as they did for their first passage. Whether or not this can be done with the Malheur county rise will show the authors of other salary rise bills what course to pursue.

Speaker Carlin warned members some time ago that the salary rise legislative children probably would receive a chilly reception in the gubernatorial office, and he seems to have known what he was talking about.

COUNTY AGENT REPORTS ON WORK DURING MONTH

Reports on the activities of the county agent's office for the past month were announced recently by O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent.

The following is the report: Received 267 office calls and 31 telephone calls in regard to farm problems.

Wrote 220 individual letters. Mailed 875 copies of 12 circular letters.

Visited 10 farms. Traveled 790 miles by automobile.

Specialists from the Oregon Agricultural college cooperated a total of 17 days with the county agent.

The county agent or cooperating specialists spoke at 19 meetings with a total attendance of 578.

Number of days devoted to various projects was as follows: soils and rodents, 1.0 days each; miscellaneous and organization, 1.50 days each; animal husbandry, 2.5 days; horticulture, 2.5; farm crops, 3.0; dairy husbandry, 5.0; rural engineering, 8.0.

LOGGING CAMP AND MILL EMPLOYMENT INCREASES

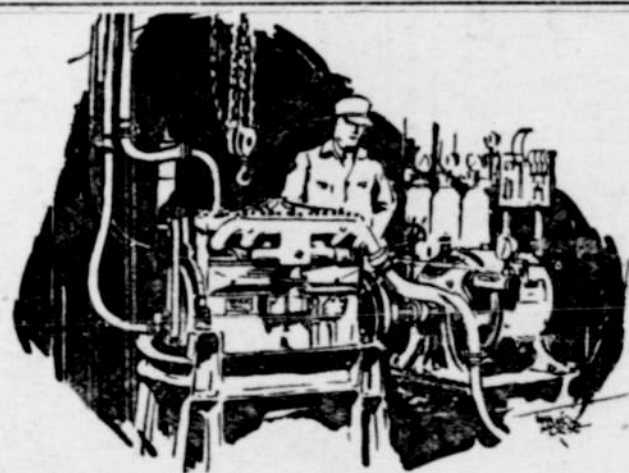
PORTLAND, Feb. 10.—(Special).—Employment in the logging and lumber manufacturing industry of the Pacific Northwest is on the up-turn, according to the 4L employment letter published recently. Snow and cold weather have been factors in keeping fir logging at a lower point than usual, but with the coming of rains and warmer weather many camps have resumed work.

In the pine districts just east of the Cascades, where preparations for the season's cut are now being made at many sawmills and where three or four major operations have begun actual sawing, employment is also on the gain. Fir lumber manufacturing along the west coast is not yet so active as it was last year at this time, the 4L letter stated. It pointed out that there are plants, mostly medium and small-sized ones, that are still down, with opening dates indefinite, while at the same time there are at least ten night shifts that were in operation before Christmas that have not resumed

work. At several sawmills a four or a five-day week is in effect.

Taken as a whole employment in the Pacific Northwest is on a par with February of last year.
