JAPANESE TEACHER JAILED FOR KILLING

PORTLAND, Feb. 14.—(United Press.)—Mrs. Mary Hiraga, 25-year-old Japanese school teacher, is in jail here today for beating Masao Okada, Japanese insurance agent, to death with a hammer. The man was found in the woman's bedroom clad only in his underwear.

The Japanese teacher told police that Masao Okada entered her room while her husband was absent, partially disrobed and attempted to attack her. Seizing a hammer, she struck him on the head and summoned the police. They found Okada still alive but he died soon after in a hospital.

Sundials Told Mayans of Passage of Time

Recent discoveries in the ruined Maya city of Copan have proved that the Mayans' method of counting the passage of time was of a highly accurate nature. The inhabitants of the city had in reality a form of gigantic sundial for obtaining the necessary data by taking observations from an eastern hilltop to a pillar of stone or stela erected on a prominent western hill approximately four and a half miles away across the valley in which lay the city. Clear evidence has been found that a correction was made at some date after the western stela had been set up, by the fact that the column was moved from its original position in the center of the stone base to another position farther north. The correction was made when the movable New Year's day fell on the same date as the commencement of the Maya agricultural year. In the first place the sun set directly behind the western stela on April 9 and September 2, but after the removal the dates were altered to April 5 and September 6.—Illustrated London News.

Methodist Evangelist Speaks on Worst Sins

Deliberate Apostasy Considered

ed One of Three by Dr.
T. C. Henderson

"Three Sins Which God Never Forgives" was the subject of Dr. T. C. Henderson, evangelist at the Methodist church, at the Sunday evening service. In his sermon Dr. Henderson discussed the three ways by which men may become forever unforgivable.

He said, in part: "Preachers have not always been careful as they should be in presenting this terrible subject. It has been suggested that men might become forever unforgivable by a moral accident. That is, men might in a chance moment be pressed to do some extreme form of evil which is contrary to their life trend, and in that dark moment of moral invertebrate make the fateful leap into hopelessness. This can not be true for several reasons. Then ministers have called the unpardonable sin 'the fixing of character.' By that they mean that habits become so regnant, so binding on character as to make a change for the better impossible. There is awful danger in that course of character development, that is true, but though booze, lust, pride or covetousness has fixed a man's character, there is one—the Lion of the tribe of Judah—who can break every chain of bad habit and set the soul free and forgiven."

"To become unforgivable is not to so outrage the amenities due God as to aggravate Deity into vengeance, which will never relent, but it is, rather, the coming to such an attitude toward God that we can never be truly penitent again. But this chosen attitude shows itself in three ways—the three sins which God never forgives, not because He would not, but because He can not do so and still be merciful and right. These three forms of unpardonable sinning are, first, deliberate and intelligent blasphemy of the Holy Spirit of God; second, by a deliberate and consummate apostasy; third, by a continued and successful avoiding of the approaches of God's Holy Spirit to bring one to personal salvation in Christ Jesus."

"God's mercy does not fail, but man can succeed in resisting it until God can do him no more good. God pays infinite tribute to man's freedom of choice. Man can in one executive act of choice end his own probation when he will. How serious is this truth!"

Large numbers attended both forenoon and evening services, which were the best attended of any during the revival series. In the forenoon a mixed quartet of Mrs. R. L. Cooper, Mrs. Roy Leonard, Clyde Leonard and C. E. Umphrey sang a special number. Dr. and Mrs. Henderson sang a duet at the evening service. The song was composed by them and was entitled "When My Feet Press Pavements of Gold."

Jesus' Second Coming Topic Pastor Cameron

Deploping that the great doctrine of the second coming of Jesus Christ had been dragged in the realm of controversy over a particular phase of his coming, Pastor Duncan P. Cameron closed his sermon on Sunday evening at the Presbyterian church with this thought. The subject was "The Second Coming of Jesus," and is the fifth in the evening series.

"The hope of the second coming should lead to neither idle presumption on the one hand, as though our tasks were not worth doing, nor to feverish haste on the other hand as though we expected to be overtaken by some great surprise or catastrophe," Pastor Cameron declared. "Ever since the time of the Apostles, Christian people have been looking for the second advent, indeed some of the Apostles without doubt looked for it in their day, but the stern facts are that the 'Little while of Paul' and the 'Near at hand of Peter' have lengthened into nineteen centuries and still he has not arrived in bodily form."

Pastor Cameron regretted that the Post-millennialists and the Pre-millennialists had fought so over this question that they had belittled the issue entirely and made many good people shy of the doctrine at all.

"Without doubt," said the speaker, "Jesus is coming again, but no man knows the day nor the hour. This star gazing that is always fixing dates and keeping people in an uproar is very severely condemned by Scripture and is not in harmony with the teaching of the Master."

"If the Master comes," said the speaker, "It is far better to be found mending a stocking, cutting a lawn, selling goods or feeding the poor than to be found on our knees with those things neglected. The Master set the standard by which we should be judged when he said 'In as much as ye did it unto the least of these ye did it unto me.'"

ADVERTISING BRINGS SETTLERS TO OREGON

Response to the campaign of advertisements in farm journals increases with the passing of winter days, according to the records of the land settlement department of the state and Portland chambers of commerce.

As many as 150 letters a day are reaching the office bearing inquiries concerning farm opportunities, declaring the writers' intentions to settle in Oregon within the next few months and giving names of neighbors and friends likewise interested in coming to this state.

Every day brings also many farm seekers in person, men who have disposed of their lands in the east and middle-west and are looking for new homes. According to the records, thirty-one families from outside the state settled on Oregon farms during January. It is estimated that these newcomers made investments totaling \$133,640.

Inquiries were received from 2124 persons during the month and literature and a questionnaire sent to each inquirer. During January 135 questionnaires were returned indicating definitely that the same number of families were coming to Oregon to locate.

More inquiries are coming from good substantial prospective settlers than ever before and Oregon is assured a greater number of new farmers in 1927 than in any former year.

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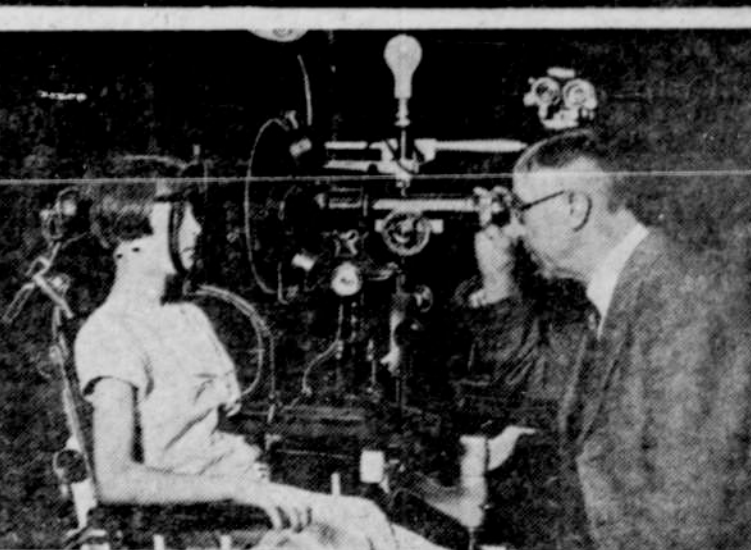
