Under the Big Dome

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore., Feb. 14.—The Lane salary bill has passed both houses. It provides that the increases shall not become effective for two years. It is hoped that this may get the governor's approval, even though some of the increases will become effective during the incumbency of County Judge Barnard, County Commissioner Crowe and Treasurer Schiska.

Mahlon H. Harlow, former commissioner of Lane, was an interested spectator at the seat of Representative Potter during the fish fight today.

C. W. Washburne, Junction City banker, was a visitor here today. He came to express his opposition to a senate bill that would restrain banks in the solicitation of trust funds.

Representative Howard had no trouble today in putting over in the house his bill to limit load weights on six-wheel trucks to 25,000 pounds and to regulate the distance between wheels. This is one piece of legislation to affect the trucking interests that was not

opposed by them. Howard said that only three trucks in the state would be affected by the law. Howard's bill to require trucks to go to pneumatic tires is yet to come up.

The state of Oregon probably could settle the biennial fish controversy by going out of the business of propagating fish, for it is seriously stated that without artificial propagation all the salmon in the ocean would be caught within a four-year period. But then there would be no need for a legislative session.

Regulating industries is one of the most difficult things a legislative session has to do. A new industry is growing that may become as odorous as the fish industry. It is the silver fox industry. Former Senator Nikellson was here today from The Dalles to learn whether there is a law regulating the conduct of fox farms and, if not, whether something couldn't be done about it. It seems that his residence is in proximity to a fox farm of six acres on which 200 foxes do their best to make the air unfit for consumption. "We have to close our house up tight nights in order not to be asphyxiated when the wind blows our way."

Both houses have passed a resolution appropriating \$600 for a painting of former Governor Pierce. Some were astonished that republicans would vote this amount to paint a portrait of a democratic governor. The truth is that the republicans have been looking for the opportunity to have a portrait painted of Pierce as a former governor. Speaker Carlin expressed the wish that the portrait should be a better one than some now hanging in the legislative halls, which should not be a difficult wish to have fulfilled.

It is somewhat amusing to hear the members of one house tell the members of the other that they are the ones that are behind and are making several days of overtime necessary, while the members of the other house say, "Why, we are all up slick and clean, you're the fellows that are jamming the wheels." The latter days of this week will tell the story. The calendar this morning showed that the senate has taken final action on only 137 house bills, while there will be over 600 from the lower house. Sixty bills will be sent to the upper house by tonight's session in the lower house. Speaker Carlin declared today that the house is in the best shape it ever has been at this time in the session.

In all the sessions I have attended I have never seen so much amending from the floor when a bill is on final passage. As a usual rule, asking unanimous consent "for a small amendment" is unusual, but in this session it has not been unusual for half the bills on a calendar to receive this treatment by legislative surgeons. Important amendments are not made in this way, the usual proceeding being to go into committee of the whole or to return the bill to committee.

"We're fed up on fish" is the general comment tonight. Certainly members of the house and a full gallery of spectators received a liberal education on piscatorial subjects in the lengthy discussion today during the unsuccessful attempt to vote fish wheels back into business.

Senators have to work harder after the close of sessions than house members because of the fact that they have to work on more committees. There are but half as many senators as representatives, while the number of committees, and number serving on each committee is about the same.

Roy Ritner, former representative, former president of the senate and incidentally the most eligible bachelor in eastern Oregon, was a visitor here today during the discussion of the child welfare commission, but seemed to be not greatly interested in that particular subject of legislation.

Senator Norblad and Representative Mott have been mentioned, or have had themselves mentioned, as possibilities for congress in opposition to Congressman Hawley. It may be only a coincidence that both come from Clatsop county, and it may be only another coincidence that both have become avowed legislative enemies over fish. Incidentally, and probably with no thought to his proposed congressional candidacy, Representative Mott today took the floor to make a spirited defense of the primary law. All candidates are expected to do this.

There is some complaint about the amount of smoking done during sessions by members. If the legislature keeps up with the times, the stenographers probably will be provided with cigarettes two years from now.

To defeat a bill, reconsider the

vote and pass the bill, all within a period of about five minutes was the record made last night by the house. A bare quorum was present and a few negative votes were sufficient for defeat. Within two or three minutes a dozen more were present and reconsideration and success were possible.

Former Representative Bennett of Portland was also a visitor here today. He made a record two years ago as a no voter and for taking considerable time in debate. He had to sit quiet today and see measures passed that did not meet his approval.

The barber license bill was under discussion today. One member suggested that the barber examination should include the classics, modern, ancient and medieval history, Shakespeare, Dickens, etc., in order that they might be able to entertain their customers without confining conversation to the weather. Another member suggested that the principal qualification should be a condition of deafness and dumbness.

Old age pension failed in the house today, probably because of a belief that no one ever gets really old in Oregon.
