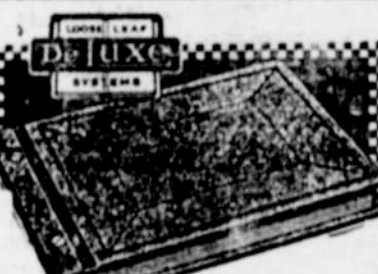

**Legislators of 1860
Had Long Beards**

STATE CAPITOL, Salem, Ore.,
Feb. 15.—Representative Settlemeir
of Marion is exhibiting a picture
of the two houses of the legisla-
ture which was taken back in
about 1860. He has the picture
because of the fact that a relative
was a member, but the members
are so covered with whiskers that
Settlemeir was unable to pick out
the relative. With the exception
of three or four, all grew luxuriant
crops of chin alfalfa, while today
there is not a set of whiskers in
either house and not over two or
three wear moustaches. Many of
the members are experiencing diffi-
culty in growing enough hirsute
adornment to patch the tops of
their heads.

for the tip in these days.

**"OLD IRONSIDES" TO BE
NAVAL HISTORY MUSEUM**

WASHINGTON, Feb. 17.—United
Press.—The U. S. Frigate Con-
stitution, known in history as
"Old Ironsides," will be fitted out
as a naval museum of the period
in which she won her fame, ac-
cording to plans of Secretary of
the Navy Wilbur.

When the ship has been recon-
structed and refitted to the small-
est detail of her original equip-
ment, relics of "Old Ironsides"
now in possession of the govern-
ment will be assembled as part
of the exhibit and efforts will be
made to secure mementoes of the
famous fighting vessel from rela-
tives and descendants of those who
served on her.

After reconstruction is com-
pleted, for which a fund is now
being raised, Secretary Wilbur
plans to send "Old Ironsides" on
an extended cruise during which
she will visit many ports of the
United States. Reconstruction of
the frigate will be started in
Boston Navy Yard when sufficient
funds are available.
