DELIGHT VALLEY ASKS FOR REVETMENT WORK

A delegation of Delight valley farmers called upon the county court Friday to ask that piling be driven along Row river to protect the roads in different places. During the recent freshet considerable flood damage was done to the roads in that section.

Revetment work below the steel bridge over Row river saved adjacent property from considerable damage. The revetment wings were put in this winter and stood up well under the strain. One wing was damaged by a fallen tree.

DOG LICENSE PRICE TO DOUBLE TUESDAY

There are at least 2500 dogs in Lane county, at least more than that number of dog licenses were issued at the office of the county clerk two years ago and there have been no indications of any falling off in the number of dogs since then.

So far this year the county has issued 450 licenses indicating that there are a considerable number of canines not tagged. Next Tuesday the price of \$1 for a male dog and \$2 for a female license will be doubled.

Student Invents Drinking Cup.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 28.—(United Press.)—A sanitary drinking fountain has been invented by Paul Wiersma, student in agriculture here, to give hens pure water. The fountain is arranged so that cool and fresh water flows when the fowl walks up to drink. His departure from the trough releases a valve which permits the old water to drain off.

The invention is expected to prove of value to poultrymen who are interested in keeping their flocks clean and healthy.

Sewing Classes to Be Held.

Miss Cooley, extension specialist of O. A. C., will hold classes in sewing and dressmaking Thursday, Friday and Saturday at the Hebron Farmers' union hall. The classes will start at 10 o'clock and will be held forenoon and afternoon. They are open to all. Those attending will take basket lunches. Materials needed by those attending are needles, pins, thimble, thread, tape, shears, chalk, white muslin, broadcloth, embroidery thread and floss.

Awbrey Receives Egg Shipment.

D. T. Awbrey has just received a shipment of 100 eggs from the Hanson poultry yards in Corvallis. The eggs are from a strain of hens that have made a number of records and the pen of 12 hens that produced the shipment have as their record 300 to 328 eggs laid in 365 days. Oregon poultry raisers have recognized the value of this strain for breeding purposes.

County Nurse Starts Work.

Miss Margaret Gillis, registered nurse, representing the Oregon Tuberculosis association, has arrived and started her work as county nurse in Lane. Miss Gillis has taken over the work of health nurse here pending completion of plans for the establishment of the health nurse plan included in the extension program of the Lane County Health association.

G. A. R. Post Has Two Members.

RICHMOND, Cal., Feb. 28.—(United Press.)—Richmond has a G. A. R. post with only two surviving members. They hold regular meetings at the G. A. R. headquarters, which at one time was the scene of meetings of scores of veterans of that war. The post's roster now has only the names of George L. Herrick and Peyton R. Gardner. Both are 86.

Ears Become Attuned to Familiar Noises

That both women and men of this generation are more subject than their forebears to nervous breakdowns is the claim of most experts. On the other hand, it is denied by a few whose opinions carry weight.

The effect of the noise of modern life is being very carefully studied by the Institute of Industrial Psychology, and Doctor Miles, a member of the staff, has reached the conclusion that the bad effect of noise on human nerves is far less than it has been supposed to be. Investigation seems to indicate that one can adjust themselves to the increasing noises of modern cities with great rapidity and ease and that little or no harm is done.

Typists placed at work for hours in the most infernal uproar—steam whistles, crashing tinware, pistol shots and intermittent groans and screams—are troubled only until the novelty wears off. Then nerves quiet down and the noises cease to be oppressive.

The woman who is excessively annoyed by noise should be examined by a physician, for there usually is something of serious importance giving rise to the "nervous."—Kansas City Star.

Flowers and Coins

Plenty of money has always gone into floral exhibitions, and this is literally true in England, where a florist has succeeded in getting delicate tints with the aid of silver coins. He drops silver coins in water in which the flowers are standing. Silver hydroxide is formed and the action of the chemical changes the natural color of the blossoms, giving them shades not possible under natural conditions. After the coloring has proceeded to a satisfactory degree, the coins are removed and a few crumbs of slaked lime or mortar are added to fix the tint.

MOVEMENT TO OPEN PASS ROAD STARTED

A movement is being started by the business men of Bond and Sisters to open the McKenzie highway over the pass to automobile traffic. Reports come from that section that snow about six feet deep covers the pass and the chambers of commerce from Eugene and Bend will be asked to petition the highway commission for the use of road equipment on the pass. They would ask that plows from The Dalles-California highway be moved to the McKenzie highway in an endeavor to open it to travel. If the consent of the commission is obtained interested persons hope the work would start by the first of March.

The highway was opened to traffic April 25 of last year. The stage companies have agreed to aid in the work. Last year the stage company attempted to keep the pass open all winter by operating a snow plow. The attempt proved unsuccessful.

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GUARANTY OIL COMPANY IS SEEKING ADDED FUNDS

The Guaranty Oil company is seeking additional funds with which to carry on drilling operations at the Eugene well. Harry H. Boeckes, trustee and manager of the company, issued a statement Saturday in which he set forth the need of drilling 250 feet more to determine whether there is oil to be had in the well in paying quantities. Drillers have reported that showings justify deepening the well to the proposed depth.

The manager estimates that \$25,000 will be necessary to take care of pressing indebtedness and present needs. Mr. Boeckes says he will make no personal appeal, that all funds must be contributed voluntarily.

Books of the oil company are in Portland to be audited, it was announced.
