Kenneth surveyed his well-groomed mother thoughtfully, then replied: "I think I'd be too polite to say anything."

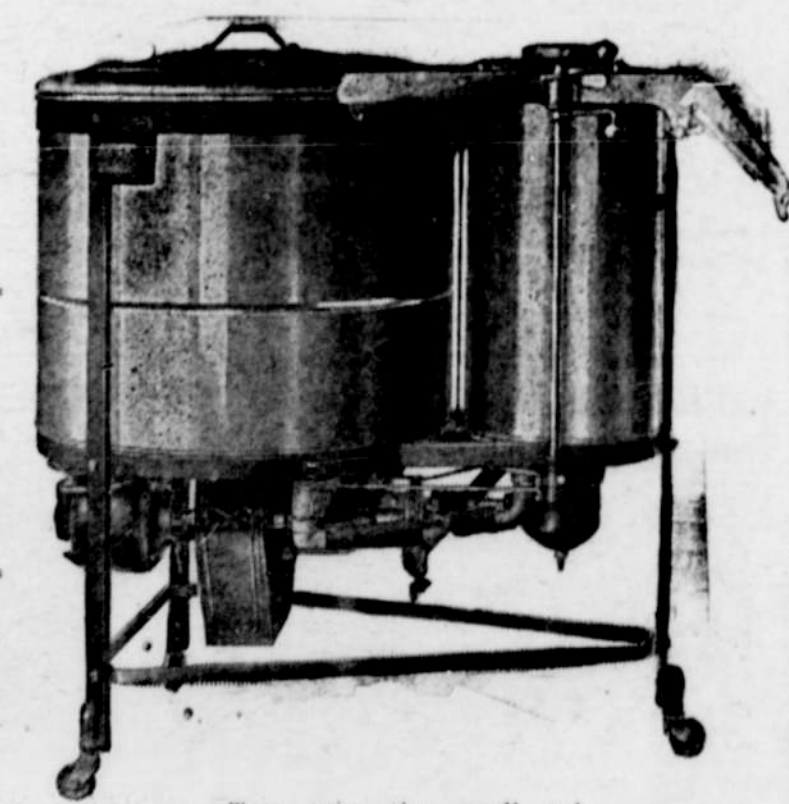
