Sinclair Is on Trial for Contempt of Court

WASHINGTON, March 7.—(U.P.)—A by-product of Teapot Dome goes on the fire here today. Harry Ford Sinclair goes on trial in District of Columbia supreme court on an indictment charging contempt of the U. S. senate.

The oil multimillionaire refused to answer 10 questions put by the members of the oil investigating committee March 22, 1924. This indictment was voted a week later—the first formal criminal proceeding to result from the famous investigation which shook the nation and helped in jarring three men out of the Harding cabinet.

The odds appear against Sinclair. The official senate record shows he refused to answer "on advice of counsel." The prosecution's case will be short, and is expected to consist of testimony of Senator Thomas J. Walsh, the oil committee prosecutor, and insertion of the committee's proceedings to establish his refusal. The government holds that is enough to establish contempt.

Sinclair's expert legal staff is expected to set forth the contention that the committee's questioning was persecution without cause, and that summoning of him was unjustified; that he had already appeared five times and furnished all evidence and answered all questions propounded; and that the committee's questions could not be shown to have a bearing on a contemplated legislative policy—in other words, that the committee exceeded its authority.

MODERN COLLEGE KID DOESN'T ESCHEW CHURCH

LOS ANGELES, March 7.—(U.P.)—The modern college youth is by no means adverse to religion. He merely desires that it be presented a little more sympathetically, tolerantly and intelligently than his ancestors did, according to Dr. Bruce Baxter, chaplain of the University of Southern California.

"If a distinctly religious appeal, without camouflage or adulation is made to the present student generation the response is sure," Dr. Baxter said.

Voluntary chapel has proven a success, Dr. Baxter believes. Outside attractions, such as musical programs, do not bring the students to chapel, according to his opinions on the subject.

"Students must know before entering chapel that they are going to get religion in undiluted form," he said. "Modern students have no desire for special features as a drawing card for religion."

Dominion Sought as the Perfect Freedom

The history of the struggle for liberty in the deeper sense is thus not merely the history of wars fought and battles won in the name of deliverance from oppression. It is the history of the struggle of mankind for dominion; and dominion is only another name for the perfect freedom.

Man has achieved not only freedom from the beast, but dominion over it, not only freedom from enemy man but dominion over him. He has achieved at least a partial safety from the elements and is erasing at least a partial dominion over them. He has learned to divert and dominate the lightning; he has made fire and water his slaves, and only on occasion does he rise against him; he has subdued the hard earth with the share, and converted its minerals and metals from dead weights into instruments of his comfort. He has made the labor of an hour the achievement of a minute; he can travel in a day by sea the week's distance of his grandfathers; and by land the distance of their month; he has vanquished the air. In these ways and others he has won new liberties. In these ways and others he is seeking liberty still—through the control of natural forces, the control of disease, the control of intelligence, the control of passion, the control of men in masses and singly.—Grant Showman in the University of California Chronicle.

Old Method of Travel Called "Ride and Tie"

Salmon P. Chase, Lincoln's secretary of the treasury, showed financial ability early in his life. When he went from his New Hampshire home to Worthington, Ohio, to live with his uncle, he was accompanied by an older brother as far as Cleveland, where he was given instructions as to how to reach Worthington. Finding he had to wait several days for a coach to take him as far as Medina, he obtained a canoe and earned several dollars by ferrying people across the Cuyahoga river, relates J. H. Galbraith, Ohio historian. In Medina he met two young men from Worthington, whom he was to accompany on their return trip. They had come on horseback, so young Chase was introduced to the "ride and tie" method of travel. One of them would mount the horse and ride forward several miles, of course outstripping the one who walked. Then the rider would dismount and tie the horse by the roadside and press on by foot. The other would reach the horse, mount it, and passing his companion, would tie it and go ahead on foot. In this way the horse was spared a double burden and the travelers made good speed.

"Wicked Weed"

Hops did not attain their present popularity without a struggle. Their use in beer was actually forbidden by Henry VIII, and in 1649 the city of London petitioned parliament against them on the grounds that "this wicked weed would spoil the drink and endanger the lives of the people." But, in spite of this, hops had come into common use by Elizabeth's reign, some century and a half later after their introduction from Flanders.

Cresote in Chimneys

The division of agricultural engineering says that cresote deposit in a chimney is a product of distillation from burning wood. Greater quantities of the deposit are produced when green wood is burned, so the best precaution is to be sure that you are using dry wood, as this will lessen the cresote. Chimneys subjected to cold winds are more susceptible to cresote than others, as the walls seldom become hot enough to carry off the excess of gas.

Immense Salt Beds

That the southwest United States rests on a bed of salt averaging 500 feet thick is the conclusion geologists are drawing from the nature of cores brought up from oil wells all over the region. The bed is known to be under the surface soil of 40,000 square miles of Texas and is believed to extend far into New Mexico, Oklahoma and Kansas. Some Texan wells have been drilled through strata of salt estimated to be more than 1,000 feet thick.

Japan Is Again Shaken By Destructive Quake

Lines of Communication Down and Complete Details Are not Available.

TOKIO, March 7.—(U.P.)—Honolulu City of Osaka, Japan, was destroyed by fire following a terrific earthquake which rocked central Japan this morning, according to advice received here today. All lines of communication from Osaka and Kobe are disrupted and the reports have not been confirmed. The report received here also said that towns of Koyoka, Yonki and Kotori have been wiped out.

Reports of death and destruction caused by an earthquake in the region of Kobe and Osaka began arising last night. Nine girls in a spinning mill near Osaka were killed, it was reported, and 25 girls were injured when a dormitory collapsed at Tokio.

The famous Amurube bridge, the longest and highest railroad bridge in the far east, was reported shaken down at 11:30 last night.

Thirteen persons were reported killed in the city province of Osaka and it is estimated 40 houses were destroyed.

Japan suffered a disastrous earthquake and tidal wave several years ago in which thousands were killed and millions of dollars of property destroyed.

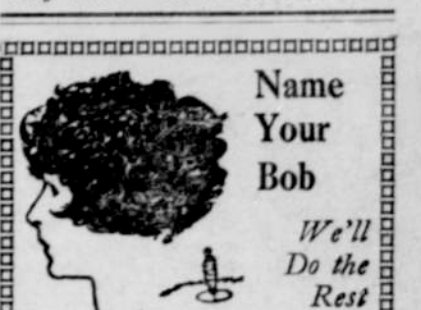
