Interesting in the history of Cottage Grove is that Green B. Pitcher, who has been chief of police here so long that kids believe there never has been any other, was a candidate for the position in 1901, but was defeated by Bert Nunn. In 1902 he was again a candidate and this time was defeated by H. R. Underwood. In 1903 and 1904 he was not a candidate and in 1905 was named night officer, in which position he served until appointed to his present position in 1907.

Another interesting sidelight on the early history of the city is that in 1901 E. M. Veatch and O. O. Veatch, uncle and nephew, were opposing candidates for mayor, R. M. Veatch receiving 142 votes and O. O. Veatch 127. T. C. Campbell received 75 votes for the same position in the same election. During the year O. O. Veatch was appointed to a councilmanic position.

I do not recall the date of service of any of them."

Acting upon the information given by Mr. Bristow, and knowing that towns in those early days were incorporated by special act of the legislature, The Sentinel has secured from the state library a copy of the session laws of 1887, which contain the original act incorporating the town of Cottage Grove. It was passed February 11, 1887.

Other towns and cities incorporated at the same time were Springfield, Drain and Oakland. The charter of Eugene was amended. Twenty-eight cities received charters or had their charters amended.

The description of the property in the town was as follows:
Beginning at the southeast corner of J. P. Currin's residence lot; thence southwest to the corner of said lot; thence north to the northwest corner of E. W. Whipple's land; thence east 160 feet; thence north to northwest corner of Mrs. Small's residence; thence east 80 feet; thence north to the corner of P. D. Knowlton's residence lot; thence east to the west boundary of county road; thence northeast to a point due west of the north boundary of J. H. McFarland's last addition to Cottage Grove; thence east crossing river, and along said boundary to east boundary of J. C. Stouffer's land; thence north 100 feet; thence east to a point 30 feet east of the corner of the O. & C. R. road track; thence south to the northwest corner of E. W. Whipple's warehouse lot; thence east 130 feet; thence south to a point 25 feet south of county road; thence west to the northeast corner of Cathcart & Veatch's store lot; thence south 100 feet; thence west 104 1/3 feet; thence south 12 feet; thence across railroad and along south boundary of Shield's addition to Cottage Grove to east boundary of Lurch's lot; thence south to southeast corner of said lot; thence south to northeast of land deeded to A. L. Wynn by T. H. Elder; thence west to center of river; thence in a southwest direction following up said river to place of beginning."

The council was given power "to borrow money on the faith of the town or loan the credit thereof or both; provided, the indebtedness of the town shall never exceed \$250."
