Spray Formulas Are Given.
Spray formulas for apple and pear scab are announced by C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector. They are as follows:

No. 1. Lime-sulphur solution 3 1/2 gallons to 100 gallons of water. Apply when the leaves are one-half to three quarters of an inch in length around the blossom clusters.

No. 2. Lime-sulphur solution 2 1/2 gallons to 100 gallons of water. Apply to just before the blossoms open.

No. 3. Lime-sulphur solution 2 1/2 gallons plus 2 pounds of lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water. Apply when three fourths of the petals have fallen.

No. 4. Lime-sulphur solution 2 gallons to 100 of water. Apply fifteen days after spray No. 3. Lime-sulphur solution used at the strength mentioned is apt to cause a russeting of the skin of d'Anjou and Comice pears except the first application. For all other applications on these varieties use one of the standard brands of wettable sulphur.

The date and formula for codling moth spraying will be given at the proper time.
